They belonged to Joshua Lewis, Thomas Jackson, Fulton Bros., J. C. & D. Coughlin. Messrs. Lewis and Jackson will accompany theirs to the old country.

—C. W. Davis, of the Tecumseh House, has offered a gold-headed cane to be awarded by vote to the most popular traveler in the Western Ontario Commercial Travelers' Association at their annual picnic at Port Stanley next Saturday.
