Not a Prophet, But Wheat Must Go Up -The Question of Rates. WINNIPEG, Oct. 4. - In an interview here Sir William Van Horne said it was extremely difficult to account for the continued slump in wheat, and he did not see how it could possibly last. One unfortunate circumstance was that wheat had lost every friend it had on the continent. Men who had stood by it and kept on buying long had all been bitten so that they had finally chucked up the job, and, in disgust, left wheat to take care of itself. While in Minneapolis he had talked the question over with Mr. Pillsbury, and that gentleman had agreed that wheat surely could not long stay where it was. At the present time it was cheaper, pound for pound, than corn. When it is remembered that wheat produces more high wines, starch and in fact every other article which it and corn are used for than corn does, it must be self-evident that wheat

must go up. "Or else corn go down," suggested the

reporter. "Well, yes, that might be the result, but Pillsbury seems to think wheat will go up. However, I have retired from the business of a prophet on wheat or anything else, and I really don't know that I have any definite opinion to offer."

Asked regarding lower freight rates on wheat, Mr. Van Horne said: "The rates are reasonable, and if people only knew how little the actual profit to the con-pany is on wheat, all things considered, they would not be disposed to blame us.
