Novelties in Invention and Application of Ingenuity.

London's Great Sewage Works—New System of Oil Lighting—Sheet Metal Manipulation.

The sewage of the largest city in the world, London, is handled by two main pumping stations on each side of the Thames, with machinery of an aggregate of 3,000 horse-power, capable of pumping some 600,000,000 gallons per day, and a like number of storm-water pumping stations, capable of pumping directly into the river 150,000,000 gallons per day—the latter being used for preventing flooding in the lower parts of the metropolis when a heavy fall of rain occurs at or about the time of high water, when the storm outlets were closed by the tidal water. The outgoing to the river 2,000,000 tons, being discharged into the open sea at a distance of about 50 miles from the works by a fleet of steamers.

The largest flume in the world is claimed for San Diego, Cal. In the course of this remarkable work there are 215 trestles, the most notable of which is 1,700 feet in length and 85 feet high, known as the Los Cochinos trestle, its construction requiring 250,000 feet of lumber. Then there is the 1,300 feet long trestle, 85 feet high—the main timbers used in these trestles being 10 by 10 and 8 by 8, put together as the stringers and raised to their position by horse-power. There are eight tunnels in the course of the flume, the longest of which is 2,100 feet, the size of the tunnels being 6 by 6 feet, with convex-shaped roofing. Each mile of the flume required, on an average, 300,000 feet of lumber for its construction, and the redwood used in the box is all 12 inches thick. The grade of the flume is 1 in 100, and the care as to insure the utmost precision in that respect, a uniformity being secured of 7-10 feet in the mile. It is expected that before long the water from this great flume will be flowing into the city of San Diego.

A writer in the columns of the Invention, a London publication, describes the new system of oil lighting by constant supply, introduced in that city—a system which places paraffine oil upon the same footing with regard to supply as gas consumers. The main oil supply tank is located in any safe position in the upper part of the house, such as in the attic, and the tank and its pipe may be outside the building against the wall, and pipes lead from the tank to the burner. The tank is terposed between the tank and the burners is a feed governor, which regulates the amount of oil, prevents any chance of overflow, and automatically cuts off the liquid when the burners are extinguished. The light is obtained by consuming the oil by a series of wicks, and the burners are similar to lamp burners, though, instead of being attached to the lamp, they are mounted on screws tight to small cups, only large enough to hold the spare wick. These cups are attached to the wicks of the arms of the chandeliers or brackets, and the wicks are kept saturated with the oil, which flows through the arms. The feed governor is perfectly self-acting, and requires no attention being tampered with. In chandeliers the feed governor is fitted in the central ornament of the fitting, but in brackets it is in a separate box. One feed will work any amount of brackets on the same level, and it gives off the oil drop by drop, so that no burner only is lighted, or in a full flow where a number are burning.

The fact that wood rapidly oxidizes at certain high temperatures and becomes inflamed is well attested. The wood lagging which encircles locomotive boilers has frequently been found to have been burned to cinders, and in some instances has actually taken fire on removing the outer casing. Here the temperature would not be over 300 degrees Fahrenheit, and the heat would not be sufficient to ignite wood, rapid oxidation at such a temperature must soon bring about sufficient heat to cause ignition. The temperature at which wood takes fire is computed at 500 to 800 degrees Fahrenheit. The more oleaginous or resinous matter the wood contains, the greater its susceptibility to inflammation, and this fact is to be made account of in all calculations.

Floods along the Mississippi, so prominent a phenomenon of late, have led to some interesting calculations by John Birkinbine, of Philadelphia, as to the watershed of that great river. His figures show that its drainage area is one and one-fourth millions of square miles, including nearly all of the country from the Alleghenies to the Rockies, and from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico. In his communication on this subject to the Engineers' Club, Mr. Birkinbine estimates that one inch of rain falling evenly over this vast area would be equal to 21,750,000,000 gallons of water, this vast flood of rainfall would be sufficient to supply Philadelphia at the present rate of consumption for 25 years. As a matter of fact, the average yearly fall in the Mississippi watershed averages from 30 to 42 inches according to the locality. The river has an average flow of 664,000 cubic feet per second, and if this went on without intermission it would develop 7,500,000 horse-power.

One of the latest novelties in the field of sheet metal working as noticed in the Metal Worker, and produced by a firm in St. Louis, Mo.—name not given—is that of steel sheets coated with aluminum, these, it is claimed, being superior to and more durable than galvanized iron plates or plates finished for many purposes for which those materials are now generally used. And this fact is to be made account of in all calculations.

A CANADIAN INTERESTED.

Arrest of Fagen Bush, Alleged Leader of a Gang of Swindlers.

New York, June 24.—C. M. Fagen-Bush was arrested here yesterday on a charge of forgery. He is alleged to be the principal member of a gang of swindlers, whose operations in Denver, it is estimated, netted \$50,000. They are also said to have operated extensively in other cities from New York to San Francisco.

Under arrest in Denver is R. H. Salt, who is alleged to be another member of the gang. Frank Parry, still another, the authorities believe, is dead.

The charge on which Fagen-Bush will be brought back to Colorado is that of swindling Mrs. Margaret Menzies, of Ontario, Canada, out of \$2,500 in 1892.

JAPAN AND UNCLE SAM.

The United States Government's Reply to Japan's Protest.

Washington, June 25.—The state department has practically completed its reply to the Japanese protest against the Hawaiian annexation treaty, but has not yet decided upon any sense abating their claims, still does not disdain to support them by much citation of precedent and international law.

The gist of the protest of Japan against the annexation of Hawaii is as follows: The acquisition of Hawaii by annexation to the United States would deprive the resident Japanese in the islands of rights to which they are at present entitled under the present treaty with Hawaii. At present there are 25,000 Japanese in the islands, with large property rights, and under the present conditions they are entitled to the decisions of the United States, as citizens of the United States, and the Japanese government must firmly protest against the proposed annexation.

IN CANADIAN TERRITORY

Gold Discovered on Oak Point Island, Rainy River—Boundary Dispute.

Duluth, Minn., June 25.—Gold has been discovered on Oak Point Island in Rainy Lake, which may lead to an international boundary dispute between Great Britain and the United States. According to the maps of the geological survey, the island is in Canadian territory, and the United States is a part of the state of Minnesota. The island is said to contain several valuable mining locations on the island.

Gargantuan protests are being sent to Washington by American prospectors. The miners throughout the Rainy Lake district are protesting against the United States cannot get a boat into Rainy Lake without first going into Canada, and the Thunder Bay Islands boundary dispute is of minor importance compared to this.
