GEN. LAWRIE'S OPINION. Gen. Lawrie, formerly a member of the Canadian House of Commons, who arrived in London during the early part of last week, said during the course of an interview upon the sensational reports in circulation, that while he firmly believed that President Cleveland's message to Congress on the Venezuelan question was only an "electioneering kite," it must be recognized that there is a very large amount of "inflammable material in the United States to which President Cleveland has applied a match, and which at any moment might get beyond his control. Continuing, Gen. Lawrie remarked: "There is, therefore, a very serious risk of certain hotheads in the frontier attacking what they cordially hate-the British flag. So far as Canada is con-cerned, the chief danger lies in a small party of these jingoes crossing the frontier in a moment of excitement and insulting the flag in a way to at once call for retaliation."

THE SULTAN PLEASED. With the Venezuelan question on the tapis there is no prospect of any concerted action in Armenia at present. A Constantinople correspondent who has been unusually well informed throughout the crisis writes recording the Sultan's triumph at the difficulty Great Britain is now placed in, and says that neither England nor any of the powers has yet done anything to save the 400,000 Armenians who

He impresses his visitors as being more clear-headed and logical in conversa-tion than usual, and more determined than ever to carry out his own plans. In fact, it is said that the Sultan is stronger than he was six months ago, and that he no longer fears the Turkish revolutionists, much less the powers. The Speaker, commenting upon the subject, says "President Cleveland has done badly for the Christians of Armenia, and exceedingly well for the murderers of the Yildiz Klosk."

MORE TROUBLE. The attempt to compel King Prempeh of Ashiantee to accept a British resident, and grant other demands made by the British, threatens to be a harder task than was at first ex-pected. The War Office no longer says that the British expedition will merely march to Comassie, the capital of Ashantee. King Premph is not de-sirous of surrendering to the British. The Ashantees are armed with good rifles, and have plenty of ammunition, their arms being supplied to them by French traders.

Trouble is also impending in the Transvaal, where the growing British population threatens to start a rebellion against the French Government unless they are conceded privileges of citizenship equal to those enjoyed by

OUT OF SIGHT. Whatever else may be said, President Cleveland has come to the rescue of the unspeakable Turk. The Eastern question has dropped out of sight. The Sultan has ceased for a week to be a prominent figure in the eyes of Christendom. He has escaped observation and has been left at liberty to order additional massacres of Armenians and continue the process of pacifying rebellious provinces by bloodshed and rapine. The President of the American commonwealth has been transformed before English eyes into an unspeakable jingo.

LIBERAL DEMONSTRATION. Though the Armenian qusetion has been shoved into the background by the Venezuela dispute, the executive committee of the National Liberal Club is arranging for a conference of the club to organize a great public de- gista. monstration in favor of the Armenians on the eve of the reopening of Parliament. NO POLITICS. Apart from the Venezuela question there is neither diplomacy nor politics this week. The Duke of Devonshire has been pouring cold water on various safe subjects. Mr. Chamberlain, who goes to Windsor so often that he is known as the court favorite, has not entirely retired from socialist politics. He has not been speaking on the subject, but a five-line letter has been drawn from him in favor of old-age pensions, to which he devoted considerable attention during the recent political canvass.
