The City Council.

Recommendation to Buy a Harrisburg Roller Thrown Out.

And New Tenders Will Be Advertised For.

"Supplementary" Tenders That Did Not Please the Aldermen—Debutures for School Purposes—Council Routine.

The session of the City Council last night was concluded before 10 o'clock. The principal business was the consideration of No. 2 committee's recommendation to purchase a Harrisburg roller. This matter led to a vigorous debate, and tenders will be again advertised for. There was a bare quorum when the council convened, but the members gradually dropped in until the following were present: Mayor Little, Ald. Pritchard, Ald. John Heaman, Ald. Brener, Ald. O'Meara, Ald. Jones, Ald. Powell, Ald. Carrothers, Ald. Wm. Heaman, Ald. Armstrong, Ald. Callahan, Ald. Garratt, Ald. Dreaney, Ald. Nutkins, Ald. Parnell, Ald. Weld, Ald. McCallum.

COMMUNICATIONS.
Mrs. John Scanlon—For refund of poundage fees. No. 1.
J.C. McAuley and John Duke—Against payment of street watering rates on John street. No. 1.
H. Steinger—For tile drain on Edward street. No. 2.
T. H. Warren—Re employment of Hussars Band at band concerts. No. 2.
K. K. Cowan—A-king that permission be given to erect closets in rear of the Oddfellows' Hall. No. 2.
John Fraser and others—Against macadamizing Colborne street, between Dundas and King streets. No. 2.
Certain ratepayers on Adelaide street, between Princess and Dufferin avenues, petitioned to have the street watered. Ald. Dreaney urged the granting of the petition, and the city clerk said that an arrangement would have to be made with the contractor, as the street watering routes had been made up for the year.

Ald. Powell said that if any more streets were to be watered two or more carts would have to be purchased.

Ald. O'Meara disputed this assertion, and Ald. Powell said that he did not know what he was talking about.

"I have money in my pocket to say that you don't," retorted Ald. O'Meara. "Ordered!" said the mayor.

"This discussion is out of order." "Keep your money," said Ald. Powell. No. 3 committee will deal with the matter with power.

Robert McLean, secretary of the Dominion Fire Underwriters' Association, wrote warning the association's request for the immediate purchase of a chemical engine, on the distinct understanding that the engine shall be purchased next year.

An application of James Farmer for admission to the Aged People's Home, was referred to the mayor and inspectors with power.

The city shoe merchants requested that a bylaw be passed by the council closing all city shoe shops at 7 o'clock each evening, Saturdays days before holidays, and Western Fair weeks excepted.

The petition was referred to No. 1 committee to bring in a bylaw. Wm. Yates offered to construct a road roller for \$3,500. Laid over until the reading of No. 2 committee's report.

NUMBER THREE COMMITTEE REPORT.
The following clause of No. 3 committee's report caused a great deal of discussion:

"That the tender of H. M. Douglas to supply coal for city buildings, from July 1 next to June 30, 1896, as follows, be accepted, being the lowest, viz.: Hard coal, \$5 25 per ton; and soft coal, \$4 50 per ton."

Ald. Nutkins raised the point that Mr. Douglas was not in the coal business and did not carry stock, and that therefore, he moved that the tender of Mr. Geo. McNeil, the next lowest, be accepted.

Ald. Wm. Heaman seconded. After further talk Ald. Powell volunteered the information that Mr. Douglas, having tendered for another man, was now anxious to get out of it.

The contract was then awarded to Mr. McNeil, whose price is \$5 40 for hard coal and \$4 80 for soft.

NUMBER TWO COMMITTEE REPORT.
On the reading of No. 2 committee's report, Ald. Weld raised an objection to the granting of Victoria Park on Sunday afternoons for Salvation Army purposes.

Ald. Pritchard also said it would be a great mistake to allow the army or any other religious body to hold services in the park. It would be a great detriment, he said, to the enforcement of the keep-off-the-grass order.

The council divided on the question, the following voting "nay": Pritchard, Carrothers, Garratt, Nutkins, Weld and McCallum.

Then the steam road roller question came up.

Ald. Wm. Heaman moved that the tender of the Harrisburg Company, at \$3,500, be accepted.

Ald. Garratt insisted on the original tender being read.

The figures in those tenders were: Harrisburg Company, \$4,100; Pitt's Agricultural Company, \$3,900.

Ald. J. W. Jones said that the committee, in recommending the acceptance of a supplementary tender of the Harrisburg Company, when their original tender was the highest, and after going to Harrisburg at the expense of the company—the procedure was not honest and not fair, and the committee should be ashamed of it.

In response to a question, Ald. Heaman said that the Pitt Company had also reduced their \$3,900 tender to \$3,600, but the Pitt machine was inferior to the Harrisburg machine.

Ald. Dreaney corroborated and denied any underhand work.

Ald. Garratt asked Ald. Wm. Heaman where the funds would come from to pay for the recently purchased road roller.

Ald. Parnell said that an equal amount was deducted from the street appropriation of each ward, to make up the sum of \$1,000.

Ald. Jones moved that the matter be referred back and that new tenders be called for; also that the acceptance of Jumbo as part payment be made obligatory.

Ald. Garratt said that Jumbo was necessary to furnish motive power for the stone crusher.

Ald. Parnell advocated the adoption of the report, and Ald. Jones again attacked the principle on which the contract had been awarded.

The city engineer, being called upon, said that there was very little choice between the two machines. It would

take a first-class machinist to state which was best.

Ald. Armstrong moved that the tender of the Pitt's Company be accepted.

Ald. Dreaney seconded.

This amendment was lost on the following division: Yeas—Brener, O'Meara, Jones, Powell, Carrothers, Armstrong, Garratt, Nutkins—8.

Nays—Pritchard, John Heaman, Wm. Heaman, Callahan, Dreaney, Parnell, Weld, McCallum and Mayor Little—9.

Then Ald. Jones' amendment was put and carried on the following division: Yeas—Pritchard, O'Meara, Jones, Powell, Carrothers, Armstrong, Callahan, Garratt, Weld—9. Nays—John Heaman, Brener, Wm. Heaman, Dreaney, Nutkins, Parnell, McCallum and Mayor Little—8.

So new tenders will be called for.

NUMBER ONE COMMITTEE.

The accounts amounted to \$5,344 24.

Chairman Blackwell and Trustee Jeffery, of the school board, were heard in support of the board's request for \$26,000 of debentures for school purposes. The council adopted the clause and the debentures will be issued.

INQUIRIES.

Ald. Parnell asked if the assessment roll had been printed according to specifications. He pointed out that unless he knew who his tenants were he could not tell his total assessment.

Ald. Garratt—Ald. Parnell will know what his assessment is when he gets his notice to pay his taxes. (Laughter.)

The city clerk explained that the roll had been printed according to specifications, but was merely an extract of the original roll.

The mayor said that it would be impossible to print the roll in full.

Ald. Nutkins protested that something should be done at once to abate the nuisance caused by the emptying of sewage from the Military Barracks into Carling's Creek and Kingston street. The board of health will deal with the matter.

Ald. Wm. Heaman asked the chairman of No. 3 committee what was being done re public swimming bath.

Ald. Powell said that there were no funds.

MOTIONS.

Ald. Garratt moved the adoption of his notice of motion making it binding on all municipal corporations to pay the union scale of wages. Referred to No. 2.

A motion by Ald. Parnell to change the location of a couple of lights on the Wharmcliffe was referred to No. 3 committee with power.

LONDON CONFERENCE.

Members of the Stationing Committee on Their Way to Strathroy.

Some Unexpected Changes in Stationing Expected Because of the Addition of Half of Guelph Conference—A Keen Contest for the Presidency.

The London Conference meets in the Methodist Church, Strathroy, this week. The stationing committee met last night, and the ministerial body will meet on Wednesday. Among the clergymen who were in town yesterday on their way to the meeting of the stationing committee are Rev. Joseph Flood and Rev. A. L. Russell, Leamington; Rev. Mr. Parsons, Morpeth; Rev. Joseph Philip, Ridgeway; Rev. Mr. Bartrop, Sheddin; Rev. A. H. Go, Springfield; Rev. Dr. Willoughby, and Rev. J. S. Fisher, Listowel. Rev. Joseph Ward is the delegate from London.

Outside the routine work of the conference, the only matter of importance to come before the body will be the redistribution of the territory rendered necessary by the action of the general conference in attaching about half of the Guelph Conference to the London Conference. This will make the work of the stationing committee much more difficult than usual, and there may be some unforeseen changes in status. It is also said that there will be a keen contest for the presidency of the conference, rendered more so by the coalition. The Guelph contingent will, it is said, nominate Dr. Williams, of Mitchell, and many members of the London conference think that Rev. John Leary, of Sudbui, is entitled to that honor. Rev. J. Sheppard, Muncey, is the retiring president.

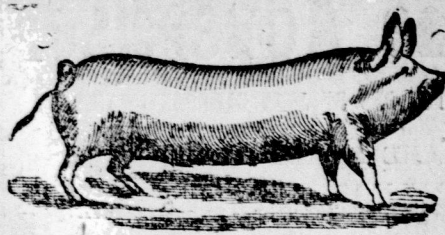
