Moore's Maliciousness

Stabbed James Robinson and Gets 18 Months in the Central.

Hinks Moore Goes to Jail for Two Months - The Plea of Provocation and Self-Defense of No Avail,

The Newbury stabbing case was disposed of this morning by Judge Wm. Elliot. On Saturday afternoon, a number of witnesses were called both for James Robinson in the abdomen with a pocket knife on the night of Dec. 30. Both men had been drinking, and the affair grew out of Hinks Moore's

assault upon George Robinson.

Judge Effiot, in addressing Wm. Moore, the older prisoner, a man of about 50 years, said there was no doubt that he had stabbed Robinson. His ground of defense rested upon provocation, but the judge could not accept that. Moore had sworn that had he not used the knife, his life would have been in danger. That he could not accept, as he did not think there was sufficient provocation for the act of stabbing a man with a weapon like a pocket knife, and that such In reply to the judge's question as to what he had to say, Moore said: "I had provocation, and if I had not used

the knife, I probably would have lost my life." "The sentence," continued the judge, "is that you be imprisoned in the Central Prison for eighteen months." Hinks Moore's crime, in the judge's opinion, was of much less magnitude. although the assault was a serious one, and the outcome of a brawl, such as seemed, he said, "to occur with reg-ularity at Newbury." He could not accept the plea that there was sufficient provocation in this case either. but sentenced Hinks to two months in the common jail.
