WITH ONLY ONE LEG.

Life Useless to a Great Dancing Master.

De Bebeyran, Who Taught Marie Jansen and Lillian Russell, Worried to Death.

(New York Recorder.)

Prof. Mamet de Bebeyran, who for the last thirteen years has been the leading instructor of ballet dancers in this city, died early on Christmas morning at the Post Graduate Hospital, in East Twentieth street. He had a dancing academy at 6 East Fourteenth street for public and private classes, where nearly all the girls who take part in the largest ballet dances given at the different theaters were given lessons by him.

About a month ago, while illustrating the method of doing a high kick and a grand jeté by muscular action instead of a sudden propelling force in the presence of one of his pupils, De Bebeyran fell and slightly injured his left leg. The skin was scraped off where it came in contact with the floor, but he did not mind and kept on with his lessons as usual. The leg after a few days became very painful, and compelled him to stop dancing. Then he had a severe attack of grip, and was forced to remain at home. The grip weakened his constitution so that it could not resist the progress of the gangrene which set in around a sore on his leg. He became very weak, and was taken to the Post Graduate Hospital. The doctors tried to save the leg, but their effort was useless, and last Friday it was amputated close to the thigh. The doctors said De Bebeyran had a fair chance of recovery, but he worried so about not being able to dance again that he could not get any rest. He talked all the time about his old pupils, including Emma Juch, Amanda Fabris, Isabella Urquhart, Fannie Rice, Marie Jansen and Lillian Russell, all of whom were taught to take the steps which have pleased thousands of admirers under his direction. His death resulted from blood poisoning.

Prof. De Bebeyran was 56 years old, and was brought here from Paris fifteen years ago by Eugene Tompkins. He danced under Tompkins' management all over the country and appeared in "Michael Strogoff," "Jalma" and "A Voyage in Southern Seas." He scored a great hit wherever he appeared. He intended to return to Paris next month, where he was always very popular. He had entire charge of the ballet of the American Opera Company during its existence, and yesterday Mrs. Thurber, who was greatly pleased with the way he worked to make his part of the show a success, said that she would pay the expenses of his funeral. The funeral services will be held at 10 o'clock this morning at the Church of St. Vincent de Paul, and hundreds of his former pupils have made arrangements to attend.

WESTERN ONTARIO.

BRUCE.

Dr. Leander Harvey, one of the leading citizens and best-known physicians of Watford, died at his residence in that town recently. He was about 60 years of age, a Nova Scotian by birth and educated at Kingston. He was much respected.

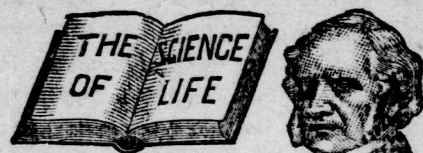
