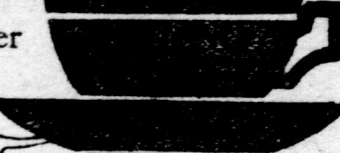

AN EMBASSY BURGLARIZED.
Washington, D. C., Sept. 14.—Burglars entered the British embassy last night and stole from the room of the housekeeper, Miss Clara Childs, a sum of money most of her jewelry, and a gold watch and chain. Ambassador and Mrs. Bryce are in Europe, and Miss Childs, who is in charge of the em-

bassy, reported the matter to the police, who have been doing repair work at the embassy. William Owen, mechanics, during the reign of William and Mary bachelors and widowers over 25 years were taxed one shilling yearly.

Disastrous Fire at Biddeford, Maine

Biddeford, Maine, Sept. 15.—A spectacular fire, which caused a property loss estimated at \$300,000, destroyed more than 15 acres of lumber yards, more than a score of tenement buildings, several factories and some railroad property early today, on both sides of the Saco River, in the cities

of Saco and Biddeford. The fire started in a pile of shingles in the lumber yard of George A. Crossman & Sons, on the Saco side, and was carried across the river by the wind. More than 40 families were rendered homeless, but so far as known, no one was injured.

Two Killed in a Boiler Explosion

Linwood, Sept. 14.—Thomas Huber and George Attig were instantly killed here today by the explosion of a boiler in the former's cider mill.

The bodies were hurled some dis-

tance from the mill and were terribly mangled. A defect in the boiler is supposed to have been the cause of the accident. Attig was assistant to Huber.

MR. MURPHY IS PERSONA GRATA

Toronto and Ontario Catholics Asked That He Succeed Secretary Scott.

Ottawa, Sept. 14.—It is a well known fact that Mr. Murphy's appointment to the cabinet was urged by an important deputation of English-speaking Catholics from Toronto, Peterboro, Kingston, and elsewhere, which visited Ottawa for the purpose last winter. Mr. Murphy is a former president of the Young Liberals' Association of Ottawa. He was secretary of the commission charged with the revision of the Dominion statutes, and represented the Transcontinental Railway commissioners before the Hodgkins inquiry last session.

NOT CUTTING RATES

Canadian Trans-Atlantic Lines Find Business Very Good.

Montreal, Sept. 14.—The Canadian steamship lines report business this season as being unusually good on the Atlantic, and will not cut their rates, as reported from New York. Local passenger managers denied there was any likelihood of the Canadian boats lowering their rates. George Hanna, general manager of the passenger department of the Allan Line, said he heard no complaints of high rates. He stated while the minimum rates were a little higher, the maximum rates were a little lower. Only about 10 per cent of the saloon passengers take advantage of the minimum rates. He said the Canadian lines are more than holding their own. He said that during the past three weeks over 1,000 American tourists had arrived in Montreal on Atlantic liners on their way to the United States.

MILNER SPYING OUT LAND

Freeman's Journal Hints He May Be Future Governor of Canada.

London, Sept. 14.—The Freeman's Journal avers that Lord Milner has gone to Canada to spy out the land in reference to his possible appointment if the Tories resume power.

The Archbishop of Montreal, interviewed on the Eucharistic Conference, said: "These are the most glorious days for Catholics in London, and remind me of the splendid manifestations in Rome. The sight of the flags of England and the Pope in juxtaposition is most pleasing to me, being a symbol of faith in the Eucharist and loyalty to the throne. I indeed am proud of the wonderful manner wherein Catholics have attended to show their enthusiasm in the faith."

IN MEMORY OF WOLFE

Westerham Honors Dead Soldier—Canadian Sprinter at Newcastle.

London, Sept. 14.—Service in commemoration of the death of Wolfe was held at Westerham.

Eastman, of Canada, was fourth to Postle, of Australia, in a sprint at Newcastle.

MAY HAVE BEEN CIGAR

Ignition of Gas by Match Probable Cause of Brantford Explosion.

Brantford, Sept. 14.—The latest theory in connection with the cause of Friday's gas explosion is that it was due to the attempt of some one to light a cigar. The prevailing theory generally that there was an extensive escape of natural gas in the vicinity. Holstock and Blayborough were sitting on the theaterium steps, both being blown across the street when the explosion occurred. It is noticed that Holstock is quite badly burned in the face and hands. He has no recollection of what happened. There were no evidences of fire anywhere in the ruins, and nobody else was burned.

C. P. R. LINE TO YUKON

The Big System Contemplates an All-Canadian Route.

Montreal, Sept. 14.—That the Canadian Pacific Railway will eventually build an all-Canadian line to the Yukon is admitted by a high official of the company, and it is known that at least some surveying has been already done with that object in view.

From Athabasca Landing, Alberta, to Fort St. John across the British Columbia line the road will proceed in a northwesterly direction until the Pine River Pass carries the road across the first range of the Rockies, and thence by the mountain passes the road will proceed northerly.

United States merchants now capture a great deal of the trade of the Yukon owing to the fact that they possess the only road to that country. A Canadian line, it is believed, would bring back to Canada what it should control.

BORDEN AT HALIFAX REPEATS PLATFORM

Halifax, Sept. 14.—Supported by Premiers Roblin and Hazen of Manitoba and New Brunswick, and Hon. W. J. Hanna, provincial secretary of Ontario, Mr. R. L. Borden, the Opposition leader, addressed a large audience here tonight.

He once more presented the "Halifax Platform." His speech was in the main a denunciation of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and his Government, claiming the Liberals had broken all pledges, and introduced a reign of graft.

INSPECTORS TAKE NO BLAME

Will Not Examine Returning Canadians if They Say So.

Ottawa, Sept. 14.—The superintendent of immigration when asked as to complaints of Canadians who returned by second cabin on the Corsican, that they had been subjected to medical inspection, said:

CRISIS IN DENMARK

Complicated Situation Over the Resignation of the Cabinet.

Copenhagen, Sept. 14.—The King has accepted the resignation of the cabinet, which was handed to him on Saturday by Premier Christensen, in accordance with his demand, on condition that the ministers continue to perform their duties until Parliament reassembles on Sept. 28. The situation is very complicated one, neither the Conservatives nor the combined Socialists and Radicals being considered strong enough to take office.

HUBBARD'S WIDOW WEDS

Becomes Bride of Harold A. Ellis at Toronto.

Toronto, Sept. 14.—Mrs. Mina A. Hubbard, widow of the late Dr. Leonidas Hubbard, the famous explorer of Labrador, and daughter of the late J. A. Benson, of Sudbury, Canada, and Harold A. Ellis, son of the Hon. John Ellis, formerly under secretary of state for India, were united in marriage here today at the residence of the bride's sister, Mrs. Roberts. The ceremony was performed by the Rev. G. W. McCall, of Niagara, an old friend of the family. The bride was unattended. After a reception Mr. and Mrs. Ellis left for New York en route for their future home in England.

Those present included the Hon. John Edward Ellis and Mrs. Ellis, Miss Emily Ellis, aunt of the groom, and the Misses Ellis, the groom's sisters. While lecturing in England a year ago, Mrs. Hubbard met Mr. Ellis through a common friend, Mrs. Green, widow of the historian.

MR. AYLESWORTH TO RUN

His Hearing Greatly Improved and Is on the Way Home.

Toronto, Sept. 14.—Mr. A. F. Aylesworth, son of the Hon. A. B. Aylesworth, stated today that his father was hurrying home from Vienna, where he had been undergoing treatment for his hearing, and that he would stand for North York. The Minister of Justice will reach Quebec on the 18th, and will be in Ottawa on the 20th inst. Mr. Aylesworth said that his father's hearing had considerably improved.

A LABOR CANDIDATE

Landers to Stand for East Hamilton in Federal Elections.

Hamilton, Sept. 14.—At a meeting of the Independent Labor party this evening Samuel L. Landers was selected as the Labor candidate in East Hamilton in the approaching Dominion elections. It was decided not to have a Labor candidate in West Hamilton, as the party feels that it is not sufficiently strong to win a victory in that riding.

ARBITRATION BOARD.

Ottawa, Ont., Sept. 14.—The board of conciliation to investigate the differences between the C. N. R. in Quebec and the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway and their engineers, will consist of J. Harvey Hall, for the engineers, F. Richardson, for the company, and Judge June, of Ottawa, as chairman.
