## FIRST PRONOUNCEMENT BY FINANCE MINISTER

No Immediate Change In the Tariff—Does Not Refer To Protests.

London, Nov. 2.—The two important features of the inaugural address of Mr. White, the new minister of finance, were his declaration that no immediate changes in the Canadian tariff were contemplated, and a vigorous pronouncement in favor of a propaganda of public ownership. In this connection, Mr. White stated that it was the definite intention of the new Government both to build and to operate the Hudson Bay Railway.

No direct reference was made to Conservative protests against his inclusion in the cabinet, but Mr. White rapped the protesting Conservatives of Toronto and Western Ontario over the knuckles on the words "at Ottawa" in his appreciative reference to the way he had been received by the Conservative party at Ottawa. ## HEAVY WEATHER ON UPPER LAKES

Many Craft Obligated to Take Shelter at Samia.

Montreal, Nov. 2.—Leaking badly, the barge Pella, of the Montreal Transportation Company, crept into port last night with 27,000 bushels of wheat. The other day the vessel struck the bank near Ironquels and opened her seams badly. An engine and pump were taken on board, and the pumps were kept going all the way into this port.

**Storm at Soo.**  
Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Nov. 2.—A heavy snowstorm, accompanied by a stiff west gale, has been blowing all day, and with rain, sleet, and snow, has continued tonight. Only two vessels have passed down here since 9 o'clock this morning.

## RICHESON RESIGNS; FREEDOM PREDICTED

Lawyer Asserts Accused Minister Says Surprise Is In Store.

London, Mass., Nov. 2.—The Rev. Clarence V. Richeson, in jail under indictment on the charge of slaying Miss Avis Linnell, yesterday sent his resignation as pastor of the Methodist Episcopal Church at Cambridge.

It is said that the resignation is carefully composed so as to not cause any embarrassment to those members of the church who believe the minister innocent.

It was stated by lawyers for the defence that Richeson is well versed in the law and is personally directing the preparation of his case. He was visited in his cell yesterday by Attorney John L. Lee, of Lynchburg, Va., who, after the conference, said:

"Clarence Richeson will be freed. I have heard his story and examined the evidence, and I am convinced if his innocence is proved, a surprise will come out of this trial."

## NATIVE CITY OF SHANGHAI TAKEN OVER BY THE REBELS

Nanking and Ching Kiang Expected to Be Seized In Few Hours—Appalling Scenes During Fights at Hankow.

[Canadian Press.]  
Shanghai, China, Nov. 2.—The arsenal and the native city of Shanghai were taken over by the revolutionists late this morning. No resistance was offered by the authorities or such of the public as remained loyal.

It is expected that Wu Sung, at the mouth of the Wu Sung River, ten miles north of Shanghai, and the up-river forts will fall tonight.

It is confidently believed that Nanking and Ching Kiang, will be captured by the rebels tomorrow.

Some of the foreign warships landed marines in their city before the rebels took possession. Foreign volunteers were called out and have taken every precaution to protect the concessions. It is reported that the rebels at Kiu Kiang have seized the British tugboat Sampson.

It became evident early in the afternoon that the revolutionists proposed to assume control of affairs here within a short time, though it was not thought that they would occupy the arsenal before night.

The police and native soldiers made no attempt to interfere with the rebels.

**The Torch at Hankow.**  
Hong Kong, China, Nov. 2.—Delayed dispatches from Hankow, sent via Wu Hu, describe the situation there on the night of the 1st. The rebels had taken the city and were sweeping over the city, and fighting was in progress in several quarters between the revolutionists and the loyalists. The loyalist batteries were lifting explosive shells into the native quarter, while the rebels on the other side of the river had begun to fire long-range guns into play from the Wu Chang fortifications, and were firing on the loyalist positions.

The revolutionists were also firing on the loyalist positions, and several stray shells dropped in the British concession, but without doing serious damage.

The Viceroy of Canton has dispatched a gunboat to this city to transport an immense supply of ammunition, firearms and Maxims, which has been contracted for with foreign firms here.

## APPLES ALL RIGHT AROUND KINCARDINE

Unfavorable Conditions Did Not Ruin the Harvest as Was Expected.

[Special to The Advertiser.]  
Kincardine, Nov. 2.—The apple harvest in this district is turning out to be a great deal better than was anticipated. The impression was general for some time that the apples were going to be a total failure as a result of the hot summer and the terrific gales in September. Notwithstanding that many were shrivelled by the heat and that many others were blown down, most farmers are finding that they will have enough for themselves and some to sell.

The National Land, Fruit and Packing Company, of Toronto, had the last barrel of the season put on the cars here yesterday, making about 3,000 barrels from this station, within the city's garbage. Tenders were received from Wu Hu by a special dispatch boat.

Complains reaching this city today that the rebels holding the forts below Kiu Kiang have been firing indiscriminately at steamers passing that city in the night time.

The latest advices from Hankow give assurance that the foreign concessions are safe, and have not been seriously disturbed by the rioting in the native city.

The situation continues quiet in Yang Chow, Ching Kiang, Su Chow, Wu Sung and the other down river points on this side of Nanking.

**Yunnan Revolts.**  
Shanghai, China, Nov. 2.—The Province of Yunnan, on the southwestern frontier of China, has declared its independence, according to reports received here tonight.

Yunnan is the southwesternmost province of China, fronting on Tibet and Burma. It is a mountainous region, having an area of nearly 150,000 square miles. Its population is estimated at 12,000,000. Yunnan contains China's richest mineral deposits and boundless stores of anthracite coal. Agriculture and stock-raising are extensively carried on, and the province produces some of the best grades of tea in the empire. It was the principal scene of the great Mohammedan rebellion which lasted for sixteen years, and was suppressed in 1872.

London, Nov. 2.—Lord Mountstephen has given a donation of \$50,000 towards the establishment of a Scottish Presbyterian fund which proposed to confer an old age pension of \$600 a year on clerymen of seventy years of age and over.
