Boss of the Borden Administration, Says Mr. Carvell in Stinging Attack.

SPEECH DEBATE GOES ON

The Government Forces Write Under Criticism of Messrs. Carvell, Macdonald, and Hon. Mr. Pugsley.

Ottawa, Nov. 21.—The Opposition promptly renewed the attack when the House of Commons met today, and kept the Government, manifestly embarrassed, all at ease and on the defensive throughout.

The issue for which reciprocity stood in the recent campaign, the securing of larger markets for the Canadian producer, was not dead, declared Mr. F. B. Carvell, who resumed the debate on the address in reply to the speech from the throne.

"The Government which would loyally serve the interests of this great and growing Dominion must set itself to secure good markets for its increasing productivity," the policy of raising tariff barriers higher and higher could not ultimately survive.

"It is not necessary," said he, "to place a larger protection on imports to make a home market."

"I am glad to have this intimation from the minister, that there is to be no increase in tariff, at any rate," rejoined the New Brunswick Liberal.

This brought Mr. Foster to his feet again with alacrity. "I did not say that," he observed, amid Liberal laughter.

"Ah," observed Mr. Carvell, smiling. "I thought the honorable gentleman had gone farther than he intended."

Proceeding, he arraigned the Government for conducting an election campaign based upon race and religious prejudices, and, after a long and heated question, scored the Government on Page Ten.

STEEL MEN ASK FOR BOUNTY ON PIG IRON

Want it as Provisional Expedient Until Tariff Can Be Revised.

ACTION FOR \$10,000 NOW BEING FOUGHT

O'Neil vs. London Township
At Et Being Heard Before Judge Middleton.

Trial of the action brought by Melvin O'Neil, of London Township, against the Township of London and T. Clatworthy, proprietor of the weigh scales established by the municipality at Hilderton, for \$10,000 damages for personal injuries commenced before Justice Middleton at the non-jury sessions of the high court yesterday afternoon, and is still in progress today.

A great deal of evidence is being taken in the matter. The plaintiff himself being examined very closely by counsel for three parties interested regarding the overturning of the load of hay on the scales when he met his injuries.

Medical evidence was also submitted to show that Mr. O'Neil's injuries are of a very serious nature. Mr. T. G. Meredith, K. C., and Mr. P. H. Bartlett are acting for O'Neil, Meredith & Meredith for the township, and J. M. McEvoy for the co-defendant, T. Clatworthy.

The Evidence.
The greater portion of the time this morning was spent with G. McCandless, a farmer, who was on the stand shortly after the accident. In the witness box. His testimony chiefly concerned the location of a certain rotten plank in the roadway, which it is said had considerable to do with the overturning of the load of hay when O'Neil was hurt.

When asked how much of the plank was exposed above the dirt on the road, McCandless repeatedly asserted that it was "five feet, more or less."

Mr. McEvoy endeavored to have him use the word "approximately" instead of more or less, as he claimed that the judge cautioning the witnesses not to so offend again.

The case will probably take up the greater part of the afternoon.

CHOOSE THE CELL INSTEAD OF FINE

The Unrepentant Suffragettes Go to Jail for Tuesday's Demonstration.

MANY ARE MERE GIRLS

Fashionable Club Members Were Driven From the Windows by a Shower of Stones.

London, Nov. 22.—Unrepentant suffragettes to the number of 225, many of whom are apparently still in their teens, appeared at Bow street police court this morning to answer for their sines of yesterday, and were sentenced to fines, or alternative terms of imprisonment, varying from a fortnight to a month. The women invariably chose prison instead of a fine.

Counsel for the public prosecutor said in speaking to the charge, that he could not adequately describe the "disgraceful and discreditable scenes of organized disorder," of which the accused were guilty.

From the evidence it is quite certain that the militant suffragettes acted yesterday on a complete plan of campaign. As soon as they were repulsed by the police they ran up in Parliament Square, where they dispersed into small groups, who mixed with the crowds.

Fought With Vigor.
These were kept in constant movement by the police. Occasionally a missile was hurled from the middle of the throng, but the police were unable to detect the thrower. This gave the militants more confidence, and as they came within reach of the Government offices in Whitehall, and the surrounding streets, the throwing of stones became more frequent and excited shouts of "Votes for Women!" were raised. It was here that the most of the arrests were effected. Some fought their captors with great vigor.

Stoned Club Windows.
At the National Club on Thames Embankment the excitement reached its height. The club members were driven from the windows by a shower of stones.

HALLOWAY SETTLED CASE FOR \$300

Action Against the City for Damages Did Not Go to Trial at Sessions.

NOT GUILTY VERDICT IN CONSPIRACY CASES

No Case Made Out Against Messrs. Downs, Fraser, Ferguson and Watson.

He, hereupon, discharged the four accused men.

SUNDAY CAR AGITATION MAY AGAIN INTEREST THE ELECTORS

A Move Is On Foot to Ask the City Council to Have Another Plebiscite Taken So That Further Representations May Be Made to Government at Toronto.

There is a possibility that a vote on Sunday cars will be taken at the municipal elections on Jan. 1.

An agitation is on foot at the present time, and The Advertiser was informed by several gentlemen behind the movement that in all probability they will ask the council to submit another plebiscite to the people on the question.

"The reasons for asking that a plebiscite be submitted at this time is the unsatisfactory results from the census," said one of the gentlemen interested. "It was fully expected, not only by the Premier, Mr. James Whitney, but by the cabinet, that a definite announcement will be made, would have 50,000 people when made shortly."

AMERICANS BUYING KINGVILLE SPAWN

Special Government Steamer Sent to Get Whitefish for Hatchery.

Kingsville, Nov. 22.—The United States Government boat Perry is here with a special agent on board, who is buying all the whitefish spawn he can obtain for the hatchery on Put-In-Bay Island. He has already secured a quantity, but there are some who feel that it is not a wise proceeding to deplete the local fisheries to the extent that will be done if any very large amount of spawn is sold. It is stated that 90 per cent of the spawn secured here will be hatched successfully, while in the methods employed in the hatchery only about 10 per cent is hatched.

FLEET AT BERMUDA.

Hamilton, Bermuda, Nov. 22.—The British fourth squadron arrived here this morning, 24 hours late, owing to a heavy gale which was encountered off the islands.

Rear Admiral Bradford, who is in command, was received by officers of the corporation and a guard of honor from the Bedfordshire regiment. There will be a big reception at the Government House on Saturday. Bermuda will otherwise entertain the fleet during its stay here. It is five years since there has been a rear admiral at the station.

Chesty—Coding.

A quiet wedding was celebrated this afternoon at the Talbot Street Baptist Church, parsonage, 134, Maple street, when Mr. Harold Chesty and Miss Olive Myrtle Cox, both of Paris, were united in marriage by Rev. H. H. Bingham. The young couple were unattended. After a honeymoon in London, they will reside in Paris.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Mr. Quints answered a number of questions asked by the mothers on the subject of the lecture.

NO EVIDENCE OF ROBBERY

Delbert Bottrel Appears in Court on Charge Laid by W. Chivas.

TWO STORIES ARE TOLD

Bottrel Says He Found Money on Floor of Bar, and at Once Returned It to Owner.

The magistrate reserved judgment until Monday in the case of Delbert Bottrel, who is charged with robbing William Chivas of a sum of money. The evidence was taken in the case, but there was nothing to prove that Bottrel had actually stolen the money.

The Chivas was very drunk at the time, and hardly knew what had happened to him. The alleged robbery is supposed to have taken place in the Bank Hotel on Friday night.

Chivas and Bottrel, together with a man named Scott, all had a drink together. Chivas had about twenty dollars in his possession. They went out into the hall, and Scott tried to persuade Chivas to go home.

Called Thief.
Bottrel was standing beside Chivas when suddenly the latter put his hand in his pocket and told him that he was robbed. He turned on Bottrel and handed him a five-dollar bill, telling him that there was his money, and that he had found it on the floor. Chivas claimed that there was more money than that and began to yell out that he was being robbed. He turned out of his pocket. Bottrel left in the midst of it, and Chivas was put out of the hotel and later arrested. Bottrel told the magistrate that he had found the money on the floor and had handed it back to Chivas as soon as he had picked it up. There was no evidence to show that Bottrel had taken the money from Chivas, and none to dispute his word that he had picked it up.

Has Bad Record.
Bottrel, however, has a bad police court record, and has spent a great deal of time behind the bars. He recently arrived from Detroit, where he served 90 days for stealing a carpet.

Mr. J. F. Faulds appeared for him, and asked for his acquittal on the evidence. The magistrate stated that he had not been for his record he would discharge him, but the fact that Chivas had lost some money and it was just a question of whether it had been lost on the street or that Bottrel took it, the matter would have to be deeply considered. The P. I. decided to reserve judgment until Monday.

CHARGED WITH DESERTING WIFE IN HAMILTON

Geo. H. Summers, Alias Woods, Taken in Custody in London.

George H. Summers, an Englishman, was arrested this morning in the city, on a warrant from Hamilton charging him with wife desertion. The capture was made by Detectives Egerton and Down, who had no difficulty in spotting their man.

Summers has been in the city some time, coming from Hamilton. He passed under the name of Woods, and was employed at several places. The local police were notified to be on the lookout for the man, and the detectives soon rounded him up. He will be taken back to Hamilton tomorrow afternoon. Summers is about 50 years of age, and has been in Canada some years.

GEORGIAN BAY CANAL

Canadian Federation of Boards of Trade Ask for Its Construction.

Ottawa, Nov. 22.—A deputation representing the Canadian Federation of Boards of Trade waited on the minister today and formally asked for the construction of the Georgian Bay Canal. Argument was based on the advantage of the route, and the fact that the scheme was practically the child of the Conservative party.

The Government had not yet had time to adopt any definite policy as regards the canal's construction, but promised to give the problem earnest consideration.

MR. PRESTON RESIGNS.

Ottawa, Nov. 22.—The trade and commerce department has received the resignation of W. T. R. Preston, commissioner to Holland, which was forwarded by cable some days ago. Mr. Preston says his retirement is due to insomnia.

HIGH SCHOOL ENTRANCE EXAMS. WILL BE HELD HERE IN JUNE

Dates Are Fixed for June 20, 21 and 22—All the Departmental Examinations Will Also Be Held in This City in June.

The department of education has notified the local educational authorities that the entrance and departmental examinations will be held here in June.

In other years these examinations were dragged along in July, and it was thought that the hot weather did not give the students an opportunity of showing at their best.

According to the circular just issued, there will be two entrance examinations this year. The first is called the senior public school entrance examination, and will be held during the second week in June. This applies largely to rural and city schools where continuation classes are being held. Students who are successful in this examination will be promoted to the middle form of the Collegiate Institute or high school, where they will pursue their courses. It means the saving of a couple of years of high school work.

G. T. R. WONT RENEW LEASE

Company Told Manufacturers Land Might Be Needed for Improvements.

A VERY HOPEFUL SIGN

Businessmen Who Was to Spend \$15,000 on Factory Finds that the G. T. R. Wont's Renew.

That the Grand Trunk still has London improvements in view is shown by the fact that several local manufacturers who occupy property which the company has purchased at one time and another cannot renew their leases.

One large manufacturer stated to The Advertiser today that his firm had contemplated making improvements to its plant to the extent of about \$15,000.

As the lease on the building expires in less than two years it was deemed advisable to write and ask the company for a renewal before the money was expended.

The Grand Trunk wrote, stating that they could not renew the lease, as the property may be required for new work in London.

FARRAR'S SON IS NO LONGER ROYAL CHAPLAIN

London Society Circles Startled by Cancellation of the Appointment.

London, Nov. 22.—Much talk has been aroused in society circles by the official announcement in the London Gazette that the appointments of the Rev. E. P. Farrar, son of the late Dean Farrar, as domestic chaplain to King George and Queen Mother Alexandra are cancelled. It is also reported by the Daily Express that the Rev. Mr. Farrar has resigned the living of Sandringham.

ORDERED TO CHINA

Fifteenth United States Infantry Will Be Reinforced to Full Strength.

Manila, Nov. 22.—The Fifteenth Infantry, which is due to arrive here on Dec. 1, will probably be sent at once to China. The soldiers will arrive on the transport Thomas and will leave for China on the same boat. The regiment will be reinforced to full strength by transfers from other regiments and will be prepared before departure for a long stay in Chinese territory. Army officials conferred here today regarding preparations for the trip.

BEATTIE SERIOUS NOW

Is Reconciled to His Fate and Spends Time With Minister.

Richmond, Va., Nov. 22.—H. C. Beattie, who came to this city on Friday for wife murder, is reconciled to his fate. Today he spent several hours with the Rev. J. J. Fitz, of the Presbyterian Church, in bible study. Dougie Beattie, his brother, is authority for the news of this abrupt change in Henry, from an attitude of smiling indifference to one of serious thought and solemn preparation.

Hundreds of persons all over the country, some in high position, have applied for permission to witness the execution. Only the jury, required by law, however, will be present.

CUMMINGS KAUGHT

Wanted by Montreal Police in Connection With Wife's Death.

Montreal, Nov. 22.—John Cummings, for whom the police have been looking in connection with the murder of Mrs. Cummings last night, was located this morning and is now in custody. When arrested Cummings remained silent, and upon being told of the information against him declared that he knew nothing of the killing of Mrs. Cummings, and, in fact, stated that the first he had heard of the crime was when he was placed in custody. He declares that he was not even in the vicinity where the crime was committed. The coroner's inquest will be held tomorrow.
