THRILLING EXPERIENCE ON MIDLAND TRAIN

But Result of Churchill's Visit Passengers Stalled for Thirty-Six Hours Lived On Soda Biscuits.

the Midland Railway, which left this

city on Friday last at 12:55, had a thrilling experience. Although Madoo is but twenty-six miles distant from the city, the train did not reach its destination until 5:10 on Sunday morning. The train became stalled in a snowbank three miles west of West Huntingdon Station, and remained there thirty-six hours. For over twenty-four hours all the passengers had to eat were some soda biscuits. Saturday afternoon the mail clerk, Mr. Chas. Moore, and other male passengers started out to obtain omething to eat. From where the rain was stalled to the nearest farmnouse across the fields was about a mile, but it was found impossible to reach the place without the aid of snowshoes, which, of course, were unavailable. The party then walked down the track for three miles, and, available. much difficulty and enduring severe cold, reached a farmhouse. There they related their experiences, and were provided with a meal, the first for several hours, and also given refreshments in abundance for those who were upon the train. The track was in such condition that the party were gone several hours. On board were five women and three babies, one of the later being sick, but was attended to by Dr. Harper, of Madoc, who was a passenger. The party were compelled to melt snow in order to obtain water to drink. Two engines and a snowplow sent from Belleville to relieve the belated train were also stalled in snowbanks. After the train started it only proceeded at the speed of one mile per hour, and went thirteen miles at this rate.




