Austria and Russia Make Representa tons of Frendly Nature.

[Canadian Press.] Athens, Greece, Oct. 9 .- Representaions on behalf of the powers of Europe were made to the Greek Government yesterday by the Austrian

and Russian ministers. The communication was of a very friendly nature, the Austrian and Russian ministers declaring that it would be imprudent in the highest degree for the Balkan States to take any action against Turkey. They would by so doing risk a great deal and never succeed in obtaining for the Christians in Macedonia any more than that which the powers were determined to get for them,

OF SECURING PEACE

Powers Will Today Make Representa-

tions to Turkish Govt. Paris, Oct. 9 .- The representations of he powers to the Ottoman Government will probably be made by the ambassadors at Constantinople today with the feeble hope that the fire lighted Montenegro may be extinguished. The press here generally forsees & pread of the war in the Balkan Peninula, but is cheered by the promise of the powers not to permit any disturbance of the peace of Europe as a whole. The Figaro regards the visit of Sergius Sazoneff, the Russian foreign minister, to Berlin as of vast importance for it directed to the allaying of any suspicions existing between Russia and Austria. The mutual confidence of these nations existed on paper, says the Figure, but this is not enough, and it continues: "A false step, a suspicion, and all Europe would be in flames." As a result of M. Sazonoff's visit, it is believed that Russia will endeavor to bring influence to bear on Servia not to anger Austria by the invasion of Novipazar. The French Government has learned hrough official advices that before the Russian and Austrian ministers made their representations to the Montenegrin Government at Cattinje the Servian and reclan ministers had visited the foreign office there and insisted that the declaration of war should be at least adjourned. Their efforts were, however, in vain, and it is generally believed in diplomatic circles that Montenegro acted at the instl-

gation of Bulgaria. Censorship Severe. Paris, Oct. 9.-The censorship in Constantinople is very severe, and nearly all telegrams are stopped by the authorities. A dispatch dated Oct. 8, received at Kustenje, Rumania, by the French semiofficial news agency from a steamer in the Black Sea, says that demonstrations by students in Constantinople followed the declaration of war by Montenegro. The population of the Turkish capital bitterly reproaches the Ottoman Government for its lack of initiative in pushing the war. There is great discontent in the army on this account, and Mussulman feeling is running high. Grave developments are feared.
