Montenegrin women are scarcely less hardy and stalwart than the husbands, brothers and sons who hastened to join the colors. Many of them, living upon the swart mountain sides of the little kingdom are capable of great feats of endurance; in eed, I have met women who have walked 30 or 40 miles a day over mountain passes and through the bare and stony defiles to attend the bazaars at Cetinje, the capital or the market of picturesque Cattaro, in the latter case having to climb home again four or five the sand feet up amid the environing hills along a path often little more than a goat track.

Their dress is picturesque and suited to tough wear.
