MR. McDONALD'S FRIENDS

MAKE AN EXPLANATION

Recent Unpleasantness in the County Council Is Reverted To.

In regard to the recent disagreement between Warden Buttery and Mr. J. C. McDonald, of East Williams, friends of the latter state that he did not say anything about striking Mr. Buttery until the latter had shook his fist in Mr. McDonald's face. Then Mr. McDonald said to him:

"You had better reserve that, Buttery, until you get in the country. Don't let us disgrace ourselves on the streets of the city."

The little tiff is still being talked of around the county buildings, although Mr. Buttery and Mr. McDonald have dropped the unpleasantness altogether.

The county councillors, while admitting that the session on Monday afternoon adjourned very early, state that the trouble between the warden and the councillor did not result in the adjournment, as on the first day of the council's session there is very little to do, and it is customary to merely get the business ready for the next day.

REPAIRS TO BE MADE TO HOUSE OF REFUGE

Contract Let to Lucan Man by County Council.

The second report of the house of refuge committee was the only business to engage the attention of the county council last night, other than the petition re the continuation school in West Nisour and the explanation by the officers of the London Health Association of the sanatorium case that was brought before the attention of the council by Reeve Munro of Parkhill.

The report was finally adopted, after several amendments had been made. The contract for the completion of repairs to the institution was awarded to R. W. Robinson, of Lucan, for \$462.50, and the chairman of the committee will inspect the work as it progresses. Other repairs that were recommended in the report were acknowledged, and will be proceeded with at once. The farm is not in as good condition as could be desired, and steps will immediately be taken to improve the condition of it, so that it will be an object of pride for the whole county.

GLAUBITZ SAYS POLES STILL ON STREETS!

London Electric Co. Denies the Charge and a Report Is Asked For By Committee.

At the meeting of the board of works on Thursday evening, the petition of the water commissioners to put down conduits on Dundas street was laid over until the next meeting of the committee, as City Engineer Wright was not ready.

Mr. Wright was instructed to go ahead with the construction of a sewer to drain the Talbot street subway under the C. P. R.

Ald. Robinson and City Engineer Wright reported that they had visited the McClary Foundry Company on Trafalgar street, where a new switch was being put in. So far as they could see, there was nothing to complain of. However, there is the possibility of an injunction being issued, and it was decided that a conference between the committee and the parties interested should be arranged.

Poles on Streets.

General Manager Glaubit reported that the London Electric Company had not removed the poles from the streets as required by the agreement between them and the city. This the company denied. Mr. Glaubit will be asked to specify the poles complained of before next meeting.

City Engineer Wright informed the committee that he had notified the railway companies to improve their crossings in London, as they were in bad condition.

Those present at the meeting were: Ald. Robinson (chairman), Ald. Moore, Ald. Handford, Ald. Coles, City Engineer Wright, and Secretary S. Baker.

NOTE WAS PAID UP SNYDER DISMISSED

Horse Case Settled at County Court Sessions.

Frank Snyder, of Hamilton, a former member of the London police force, who was arrested at that city some months ago, charged with obtaining money under false pretences in a horse deal from G. Wadsworth, of Mount Brydges, was yesterday dismissed by Judge Elliott, at the county court sessions, when Mr. John M. McEvoy, acting for the defence, explained that the cause of the difficulty had been straightened out.

Snyder sold a mare to Wadsworth for \$75, but while out driving one day the new owner of the animal came upon a Mr. Lawanson, of Carleton Place, who stated that he had an unpaid note for \$129.50 against Snyder on the same horse. The note was paid up, however, thus eliminating the cause of the trouble. Snyder was accordingly dismissed.

George Wood, a Brynston contractor, was awarded a verdict for \$144.35 and the return of \$50 worth of shingles now in the possession of the defendant, James Baillif, a London Township farmer. Mr. Wood claimed that he was awarded a contract for the erection of a barn, Mr. Baillif to furnish certain material, but that several months afterward he was compelled to abandon the job. E. W. A SCHOOL FOR SALESWOMEN.

A class for saleswomen has been opened in one of the public schools in Chicago, and some thirty-five girls from the big downtown stores attended the first session. An arrangement has been made between the superintendent of schools and several department store managers by which a number of girls are allowed to attend the school two mornings each week. They are taught "store arithmetic," English, and a knowledge of textiles. "The girls are allowed 'time' while absent at the classes, and their carfare is paid by their employer."
