**FINE RED BRICK RESIDENCES
IN COURSE OF ERECTION IN
THE NORTH END OF CITY**

Land North of St. James Street and West of Richmond
Has Tripled in Value in Few Years, and a
Number of Fine Houses Are Being Built There.

In practically every section of the north end of the city handsome red brick residences are being erected. Particularly is this so in that part that lies north of St. James street and west of Richmond, where a number of residences that cost \$2,000 or more are in the course of erection.

As far north as the river, in what was at one time known as Broughdale and where lots were sold a few years ago at from \$5 to \$10 a foot, fine new houses are being built and the property has more than tripled in value in some sections. Practically all of the houses in that part are of red brick, and one that is being built by Mr. E. C. Bowker, of the Dominion Bank, is unique, and perhaps the first of its kind to be built in this city.

For a distance of about four feet from the ground the walls are covered with a sort of red mixture. The walls of the second story, although not constructed yet, is to be of stucco. The general design of the house is unique and has been executed by a well-known firm of architects of this city.

Houses Being Built.
Mr. Frank Ware is also building a two-story red brick house with cobblestone foundation on Richmond street, north of Chesapeake street. It is nearing completion.

**Homister Hotel
and Barnes House
Close Bars Tonight**

Were Granted a Month's Extension by the Commissioners to Sell Out Their Stock.

When the city bells toll the hour of seven tonight, the Homister Hotel, on the Hamilton road, near Egerton street, and the Barnes House, Pottersburg, will close to do business for good, and the doors leading to the bars of those two places will be closed for ever.

Although the proprietors of both hotels have never committed any infractions of the law, the license commissioners decided to cut their licenses off instead of some of the hotels in the downtown section.

Many of the residents of East London and Pottersburg objected against toning that they were always conducted in an orderly manner, but the temperance and the church people waited on the commissioners at the last meeting and urged that a renewal be refused them.

The licenses were to have been cut off on the last day of April, but the commissioners extended the time to the month, to enable the men to dispose of their stock.

**WORK ON BOYS' SCHOOL
TO START SHORTLY**

Plans Have Been Prepared, But Have Not Arrived in the City.

It is expected that work on the Bishop Fallon School for Boys, which is to be built on Sunshine Park, near the new seminary, will be started in a short time.

Plans for the building have already been prepared, but have not been forwarded to the city yet. The contract has not been let yet, but it is expected that it will be given to a local man.

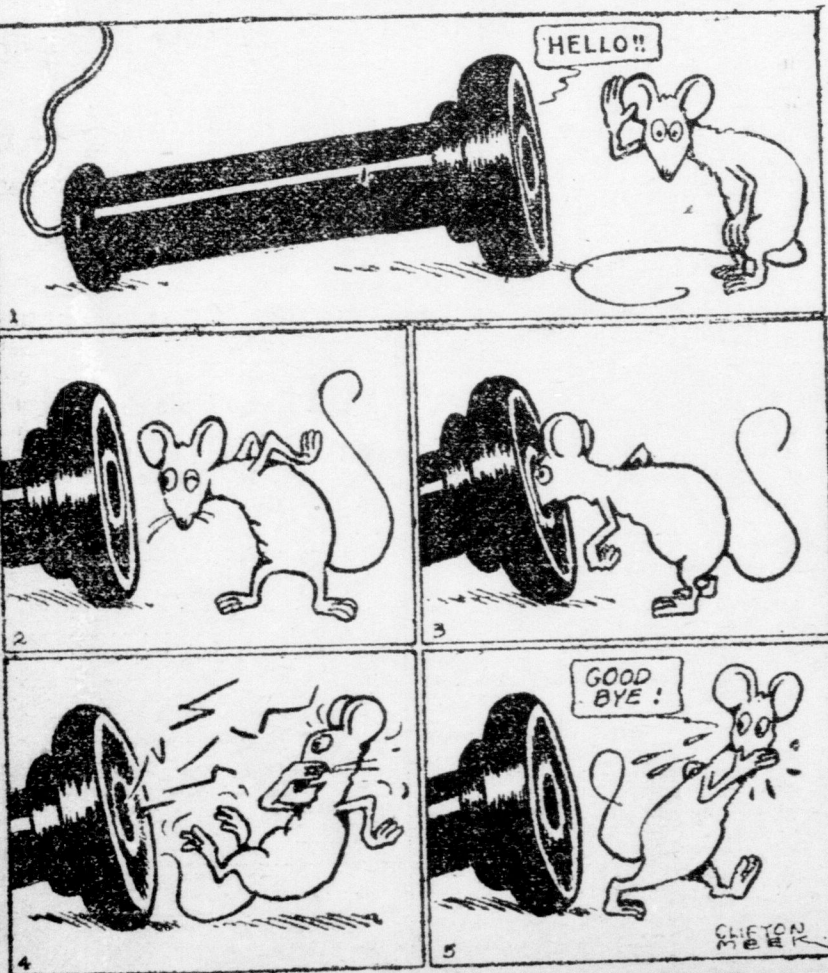
Work on the new seminary will not be started for some time.

**New Districts Will
Have City Water
Before Snow Falls**

Gang of Men at Work Constructing
Mains to Supply New Citizens
With Water.

Knollwood Park, Ealing and Pottersburg, will be supplied with city water before the snow falls, according to the calculations of General Manager Gault, of the water commission.

A large gang of men has been employed by the city for the past couple of months putting in water mains to supply the new districts. A main has been put in along Campbell street and down Egerton to connect with Dundas street and from it branches will be constructed to supply the districts in that section. A second large main is to be constructed along the Hamilton road east and also down Trafalgar street to supply the residents in the south-eastern section. Hydrants will be put in all over the new districts for fire fighting purposes, and small mains will be laid down in streets that have a sufficient number of residents.

Don't Need City Water.
A great many of the residents in those sections will not require the city water for some years on account of wells which they have sunk on their property.

Small mains have been laid throughout Chelsea Green, and the residents there are nearly all supplied with city water. Longing to Mr. George Jackson, and driven by Gordon McFadden, was truck by a train which was shunting, the rear wheels being damaged considerably.

According to eyewitnesses, the train had blocked the crossing for several minutes, and had been cut to let rigs and pedestrians pass.

The driver of the rig started to cross, and as he did the engine attached to the several cars started forward. The driver saw the train coming, and urged the horse forward. It leaped the tracks, and but not in time to clear the tracks, and the end of a box car struck the rear of the rig, smashing the box, and the rear wheels.

The horse, becoming frightened, attempted to get away, but the driver clung to the reins and succeeded in quieting it.

Neither the driver nor the horse were injured.

**No Alarm System
For New Districts
Says an Official**

Estimates Were Cut Out in Order
That the Tax Rate Could Be
Kept Down.

Adequate fire protection will not be given to the residents of the annexed sections this year, according to a statement made to the Advertiser by a city official today.

When the estimate for constructing a fire alarm system throughout the new district was made several months ago, it was quietly chopped out in order that the tax rate would not amount to 25 mills, and the people of those sections, which are becoming more thickly populated every day, will not be given the protection they were led to believe they would get.

The city has purchased a motor fire truck, which will be kept at the East London Hall. It will be able to make record time in getting to fires, but in some cases before a telephone could be reached to send in an alarm, a fire could have such a start that it would be impossible to check it. Telephones in those sections are scattered, so that a man whose house was on fire would have to run probably a half mile or more and have to tell two or more neighbors that his house was on fire before he could get in touch with the central hall.

A sum sufficient to alter the East London fire hall, so that a ladder truck could be used in fighting fires in the factories of East London could be kept out there as well as the motor apparatus was also cut off.

**RESIDENTS THINK
THE ASYLUM LAND
SHOULD BE SOLD**

Valuable Property Fronting on
Dundas Street Being Utilized
for Farming Purposes.

Should Be Sold for Building
Purposes, and Land to North
Bought for Farm.

Pottersburg residents think the Government should sell the land fronting on Dundas street, which is used as farming land by the Hospital for the Insane.

There is some talk of circulating a petition among the residents asking that it be sold for building purposes, and sending it to the Provincial Secretary.

The Government owns all the property fronting on the north side of Dundas street from the top of the Dundas street hill to the entrance to the asylum. It is utilized for farming purposes, such as growing hay, oats, and fodder for the cattle that are kept by the institution. The land is valuable, and since the boom started in Pottersburg numerous inquiries have been made of officials of the asylum as to whether the Government contemplated selling it.

Will Retard Building.
The people of Pottersburg contend that if the land is not sold and divided into building lots, so that the north side of Dundas street can be built up, the growth of Pottersburg will be held up, and in the petition to Mr. Hanna this fact will be pointed out.

During the past five years the Government has been purchasing land to the north and east of the asylum buildings for farming purposes, and people living there are thousands of acres that would prove more valuable to the Government than the Dundas street land. It can be bought for a small sum, and with the extra money obtained through the sale of it much more farming land could be bought.

Would Benefit City.
The sale of the property would benefit the city considerably in that many houses would be built on it, which would bring up the assessment in that section of the recently-annexed territory.

According to the agreement between the city and the territories that were annexed, a fixed assessment was given on all buildings on the land in 1911, but since annexation was consummated hundreds of lots have been added, and many houses costing from \$1,500 to \$2,000 are to be erected throughout the district.

"I think the Government should sell the land," said Mr. C. Lashbrook. "The property as it stands is not much good to the asylum, but it is holding back the development of Pottersburg, and the residents of about thirty houses, and until the Government disposes of it to citizens the place will be vacant. It is not bringing in any revenue to the city, neither is it an asset to the asylum, and it can be sold for half the amount in the vicinity of Oxford street."

**Don't Pay the Taxes
Get a Dividend**

Toronto Ratepayers Hear With Envy
of German City Methods.

Toronto, May 31.—In Germany there are 1,500 towns and cities that impose no municipal taxes; in some, property-owners actually receive a dividend from the revenues collected. The reason for this is that the city owns the land, and the city owns the houses, and the city owns the streets, and the city owns the parks, and the city owns the schools, and the city owns the hospitals, and the city owns the police, and the city owns the fire department, and the city owns the water supply, and the city owns the sewerage system, and the city owns the tramway, and the city owns the railway, and the city owns the docks, and the city owns the wharves, and the city owns the piers, and the city owns the harbours, and the city owns the rivers, and the city owns the lakes, and the city owns the mountains, and the city owns the valleys, and the city owns the plains, and the city owns the forests, and the city owns the fields, and the city owns the farms, and the city owns the villages, and the city owns the towns, and the city owns the cities, and the city owns the empires.

The German municipal system, Mr. Miller explained, insures permanence of government, with the result that very long-sighted views are taken in planning municipal works. This planning for years ahead resulted in rapid development and fostered a tremendous civic pride.

The reasons for the wealth of German cities were: (1) Enormous public ownership of land, and (2) extreme care in the management of public utilities. Many cities own half of the land in the corporation. Berlin owns 40,000 acres. One effect of such extensive public ownership of land was a commission to report on civic government in Ontario a good one.

Mr. Miller's last plea was for the personal equation. He could not have the best government, he said, unless the very best citizens showed the civic spirit.

CHANGE BYLAWS

Railway Trainmen Are Considering

**Mysterious Shooting
Of Charles Hubbard**

Prizefighter Is Dying as Result of a
Street Duel.

New York, May 31.—Two mysterious street shootings occurred early today. As a result of one of them, Charles Hubbard, a prize fighter, known as "Jumbo" Wells, is dying at the New York hospital. He was shot nine times, apparently in a duel with an unknown man.

A taxicab in which Hubbard, another man and a woman were riding, left an all-night restaurant on Broadway for a trip to Chinatown. At thirty-eighth street the cab was stopped, and the two men stepped out, armed with pistols. While the woman looked on the taxicab driver, Hubbard and his opponent, believed to have also been wounded, got into the cab with the woman, and disappeared before witnesses could call the police.

Hubbard is an Australian fighter who came to this country several years ago. He has appeared in most of the local clubs, but has never won any important bouts.

Police Patrolman William Barry early today shot and killed a man who was afterwards found to be also a prize fighter. Barry said he saw the stranger shooting wildly into the air on Tenth avenue this morning. He shot to frighten the man, but struck him above the left eye, killing him. The police believe the dead man is Patrick Gallagher, a probationary officer.

**Cyclone Swept Over
Northern Virginia**

Many Lives Reported Lost and Houses
Were Blown Away.

Norfolk, Va., May 31.—Accompanied by rain and hail, a cyclone-like windstorm passed over this section yesterday afternoon, and a number of lives are reported lost.

Twenty houses were blown down in Berkeley and South Norfolk, but no one was killed there so far as known. Mrs. George Harper was seriously injured when her home was blown down, and a number of other houses were falling in flames and flying glass.

Scores of small craft were turned over, and several are reported to have been carried to sea. The tug Kate Twelch, signalled a Bay Line steamer that a small sailing craft went down with several men aboard.

The big Government wireless mast in the navy yard was wrecked, and will be out of use for at least a week. The receiving ship Franklin was damaged. The Tonic Lumber Company, Green Leaf, Johnson Lumber Company and Foxburgh Lumber Company, located on the Berkeley side of the Elizabeth River, sustained heavy losses.

The city was in darkness for two hours. An audience gathered in a theatre sang songs in darkness, while the orchestra played patriotic airs.
