

Gang of Men at Work Constructing Mains to Supply New Citizens With Water.

Knollwood Park, Ealing and Pottersarg, will be supplied with city water fore the snow falls, according to the alculations of General Manager Glaubitz

f the water commission. A large gang of men has been employed y the city for the past couple of months itting in water mains to supply the new listricts. A main has been put in along Campbell street and down Egerton to onnect with Dundas street, and from i oranches will be constructed to suppl the districts in that section. A second large main is to be constructed along the Hamilton road east and also down Trafalgar street to supply the residents in the south eastern section. Hydrants will be put in all over the new districts for fire fighting purposes, and small mains will be laid down any street that

has a sufficient number of residents. Don't Need City Water. A great many of the residents in thos sections will not require the city water or some years on account of wells which they have sunk on their property. Small mains have been laid throughout thelsea Green, and the residents there are nearly all supplied with city water. Before that suburb was taken over by the city the residents had a good water supply from mains put in some years ago by the Chelsea Green Land Company, and with a few repairs made by the city it gives as good service as that received
