

EATING INTO HEART OF THE GERMAN THIRD LINE ARE BRITISH AND FRENCH

Capture of Leipsic Redoubt Was Plucking of Thorn from Side of Haig's Troops - German Morale Weakening, and Allies Now Hold Whip Hand on Somme and at Verdun.

In the first days of the war the French [Canadian Press.] New York, Aug. 21.-The Tribune's London correspondent cabled Sunday night as follows:

British and French on the Somme front followed up their victories of Friday with new attacks today, which won for the French a strongly fortified woods between Guillemont and Maurepas, and for the British a section of trenches north of Bazentin-Le-Petit. General Foch's men captured a large quantity of war material. The news that General Haig's Friday attacks

had cleared out the famous Leipsic redoubt, which came in unofficial dispatches, has caused the greatest rejoicing here, and military opinion now holds that these gains were the most important since the first stroke of the offensive. Plucked the Thorn.

The redoubt has been a thorn in the British flank since the first day It threw back the storming parties with heavy losses then, and had re sisted all efforts since. Combles Menaced. Similarly the British entry into the outskirts of Guillemont means

a deady menace to Combles. It is evident that the recent British and French intensive efforts have weakened the German morale, and made possible these great gains. which are eating the heart of the German third line. The most sigmessages today is that the Ge mans have apparently lost their power of effective counter-attack as they made but one effort to re claim the trenches near the High wood, and this only hours after they lost them

Fewer Counter-Attacks. The principle of the counter attack is one of the first taught in the German military text books. Though earlier in the Somme offensive they were ready to throw in a whole army corps for the recap-

ture of some local position, now they seem unable to scratch up a brigade within the space of twentyfour hours. In the present circum stances this is the more noteworthy because the ground the British have just gained along the watershed from Pozieres toward Peronne is extremely valuable. It incloses a space where a large striking force could be gathered without ob-

servation by the British. The added fact that German aeroplanes now scarcely dare show themselves completes the German acquiescence in the British gains, and is perhaps the first striking proof of the decay of their strength. Apparently they had specially con-centrated troops for attacks at Verdun last night, and the heavy repulse the French inflicted on them gave new proof that the lat-ter hold the upper hand.
