

AVIATOR DIES IN PLANE CRASH

Captain Holland of Ottawa Burned To Death When Machine Hits Tree.

Passenger Escapes From Flaming Wreck With Serious Injuries.

GRAND VALLEY, Ont., April 23.—One killed and another seriously injured is the toll of an airplane accident which occurred near Waldemar about 6 o'clock this evening. Captain Holland of Ottawa, pilot of the airplane, took fire, and Flying Officer Owen, his companion, received injuries the extent of which could not be ascertained tonight.

The accident occurred on the farm of George Gamble, about a mile east of Waldemar. Captain Holland was in charge of the machine, which was one of the latest types in use at Camp Borden. During the return trip to Camp Borden engine trouble developed and a message was sent to Camp Borden for assistance. Another machine was sent down, and after repairs had been made the two machines started back. The ground was soft and muddy and the machine driven by Holland made a bad start. It had scarcely left the ground when it crashed into a tree and lurched to the ground 50 feet beyond. The machine immediately broke into flames. Owen was able to extricate himself, but before Holland could be reached he was burned to death. His body was taken to Grand Valley, where it now lies waiting an inquest, which will be opened tomorrow.

The injured passenger was taken care of by Mr. Gamble. According to the local physician he appears to be suffering from a severe shaking-up and scratched face and some bruises. Between 3 and 4 o'clock Sunday afternoon they left Camp Borden for London, where they purposed taking photographs for the Government. This disaster was witnessed by some residents, who rushed to the scene, but by this time Captain Holland had succumbed to his injuries. His body was removed to the undertaker's, and Dr. Campbell of Grand Valley, who had been summoned, dressed the wounds of Officer Owen, who had been taken to the home of Mr. George Gamble at Waldemar. The injured man will be transferred to the hospital at Camp Borden tomorrow morning. The plane, which was fitted with wireless, is a total wreck.

The late Captain Holland resided at 452 Rideau street. He went overseas in 1916 with the Cyclist Corps, which was disbanded in England. He then joined the Royal Air Force and was sent to Italy in 1917, where he flew continuously till the armistice. He won the Military Cross and also some Italian decorations.

CITY BODY HAS SECRET SESSION

No. 4 Committee of St. Thomas Council Exclude Press From Meeting.

Believed Health and Sanitary Department Subject of Discussion.

ST. THOMAS, April 23.—A mysterious meeting of No. 4 committee was held in the city hall Saturday night, from which reporters were excluded, and the statement of one alderman that the meeting dealt only with the community chest movement is at variance with a rumor to the effect that Health and Sanitary Inspector W. J. Shaw's department was under fire.

Inefficiency Charged. The agitation regarding Mr. Shaw's department first came to the notice of the public a month ago, when at a council meeting Ald. M. H. Penhale moved a resolution providing for dispensing with the inspector and dividing his work up among other city officials. Inefficiency was charged. The matter was at that time referred to No. 4 committee.

At a meeting of the committee to discuss the matter, Mr. Shaw endeavored to present a statement, but was ruled out of order.

Dog taxes are said to be one of the matters in question, and it is claimed that Mr. Shaw was called on Saturday to prepare a statement of the amounts overdue. It is further declared that several aldermen challenged the inspector with the names of dog owners who were believed to

To Repair 5 Miles of Road East of Woodstock.

OXFORD COUNTY REGISTRAR PASSES

George R. Pattullo Succumbs to Illness of Several Weeks' Duration.

WAS BORN IN CALEDON

Was at One Time a Leading Journalist of the Province.

WOODSTOCK, April 23.—After an illness of several weeks' duration the death took place in the hospital this evening of George Robson Pattullo, registrar of Oxford County, and one of the most prominent and best-known men, not only of Woodstock, but of the entire county of Oxford.

Was School Teacher.

The late Mr. Pattullo was born in Caledon, Peel County, in 1845. Early in life he moved to Blenheim Township, Oxford County. He received his education at the grammar school here and at Toronto University. Finishing his education he taught school here for a time, following which he took up journalism as a profession, and in 1870 he became editor and proprietor of the Paris Transcript. In the same year he became head of the Woodstock Sentinel and later on, with his brother, the late Andrew Pattullo, took over the Sentinel-Review. He became registrar of the county in 1886, occupying this position until his death.

At one time Mr. Pattullo was regarded as one of the leading journalists of the province. He took a keen and active interest in current events of all kinds. For years he was active in politics, and was secretary of the Ontario Reform Association in 1878. He opposed the late

Hon. James Sutherland on two occasions for the North Oxford seat.

House of Commons, first in 1879 and again in 1882. Mr. Sutherland was, however, successful on both occasions.

On Boundary Dispute.

He was one of the representatives of the Ontario government in the disputed territory in the days when the boundary dispute was a big issue both provincial and federal politics, and he was first secretary of the Queen Victoria Park Commission, Niagara Falls. At one time or another the late Mr. Pattullo has acted as president of nearly every association in the city, and took a very active part in horticultural and historical matters. He was also president of the Oxford Veterans' Association, and at one time was the head of the Canadian Press Association.
