ORDER SPRING BULBS NOW.

About the farthest thing from one's thoughts on a hot August afternoon are the cool, fresh blooms of the spring—the daffodils, crocuses, snowdrops, tulips and hyacinths. Yet now is the time to order your bulbs if you wish to be sure of your masses of spring loveliness next April. If you wait until the time for planting these bulbs—September, October, or even November—you will find that the stocks of nurserymen are exhausted. Last year I wanted to have among my crocuses a mass of blue grape hyacinth and scilla, but my order was returned to me unfulfilled with the notation "supply exhausted."

Many inexperienced gardeners plant their bulbs very much too late. It is of course possible to put them in any time before heavy frost, and they sometimes do well enough; but it is much safer to put them in earlier and give the roots a chance to establish their connection with the soil in readiness to begin early in the spring.

The garden book which is my infallible guide tells me that bulbs should be planted in general by September 15. The bulbs of candidum lilies (the earliest blooming lily) should be in the ground by September 10. (Other lilies may be planted as late as October 25, or even early in the spring.) September 15 is the proper date for putting in snowdrops, crocuses, scillas, narcissus, daffodils and jonquils. Tulips and hyacinths should not be planted until October. Don't plant bulbs in stiff rows, but in little groups of say five or six. Keep these five or six all the same kind and color, even if you put them near another group of a harmonizing color and kind. One tulip carries no conviction in the garden—you must have enough to make a little mass of color.

The best time to plant just where



you will plant your bulbs is in spring itself—the time they bloom. I make a diagram or keep notes of just how I want my garden to look next spring. Then in August, or even earlier, I enter my order, so that I shall get exactly the combinations I have worked out, and get them in time. At least, that's what I am going to do this year!

POINCARE SPURNS BRITISH DEMANDS IN FRENCH REPLY

Reaffirms the Stand Taken by France—Denies Attempt To Crush Germany.

BRITAIN MUST WAIT

Paris, Aug. 22.—To ask France to take a different attitude toward Germany would be tantamount to saying that nation is right. Premier Poincaré declared in his reply to the British reparations note, which was made public here today.

Poincaré said France does not desire to remain in the Ruhr longer than necessary, and has no political or annexationist aims.

It is not a fact, the premier said, that the French claims are of a nature to crush Germany or exceed her ability to pay. France's propositions admit of amendments provided her principles are not infringed upon.

France does not suppose that England intends to claim the sums owed to her by the other allies before reparations actually are settled, the reply continued. England must certainly realize that France, in order to pay her debts, must previously have recovered her contributive power, repaired her losses, and recovered her position as a great German competitor with equal weapons.

The reply was generally considered maintaining inflexibly the previous French attitude. It does not change its demand for the cessation of passive resistance in the Ruhr; it refuses an international commission, asks 2,000,000,000 marks for France and suggests a friendly discussion, saying, "We cannot pay until after

we have received what Germany owes us."

The reply totaled 54 pages, and the entire communication 69 pages, including a reproduction of the British note. In the second section the reply was printed in parallel columns to the British note.
