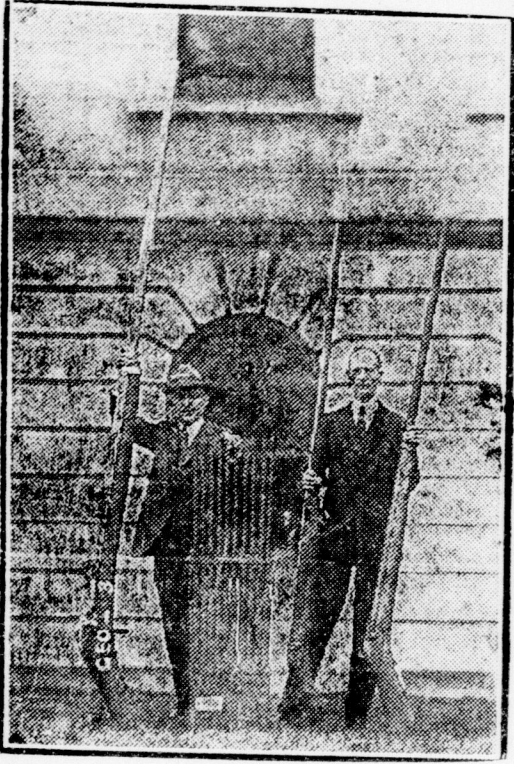
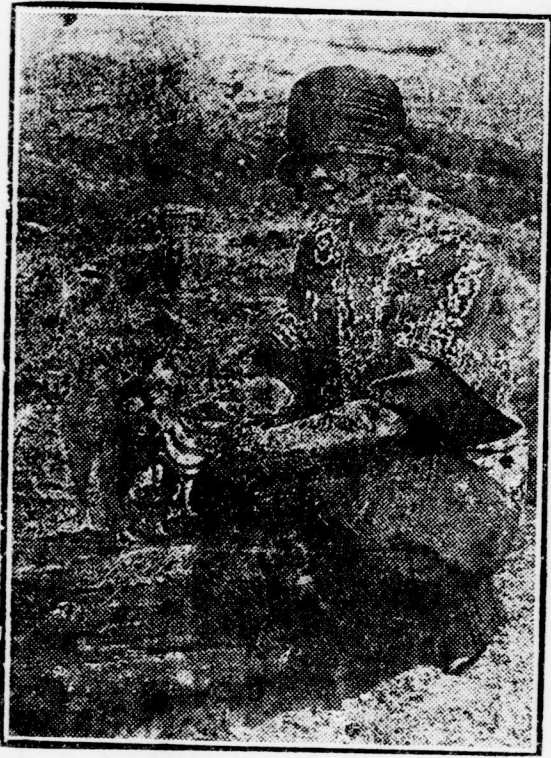


Raise Scuttled Fleet; Young Donoghue Rides; Newspaper Bungalow



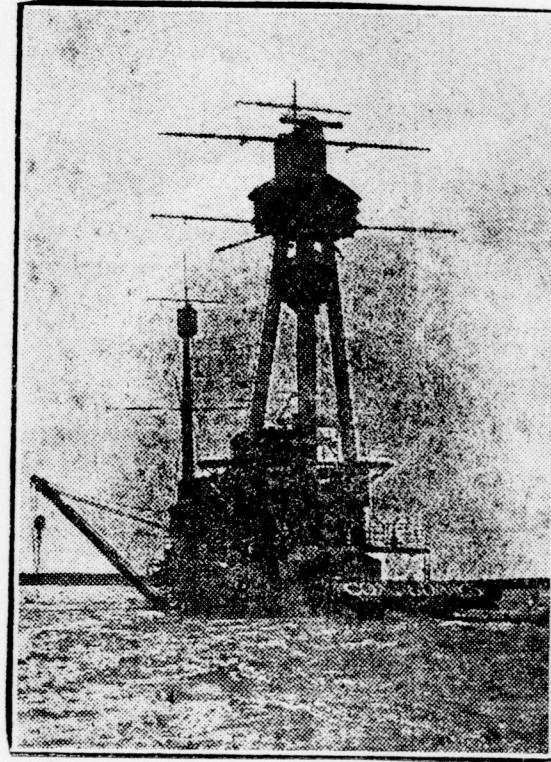

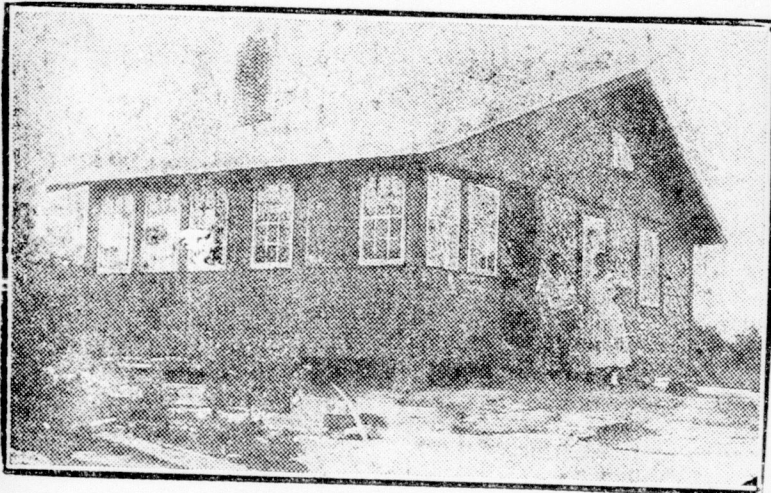

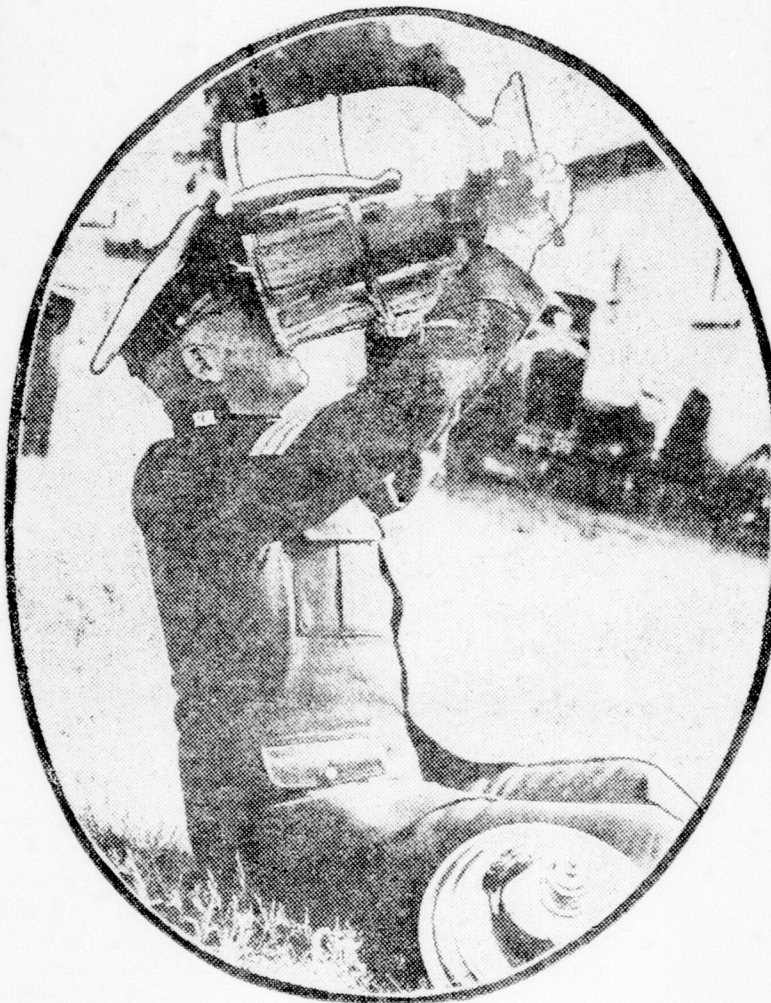
Competitors are shown taking the water in the one mile open steeplechase handicap at the Polytechnic harriers great marathon meeting recently held at Stamford Bridge, England.

Here are the faces for pie, showing the winners of a pie-eating contest at a picnic held at Oakland, California, recently. All three carried off the honors "hands down."



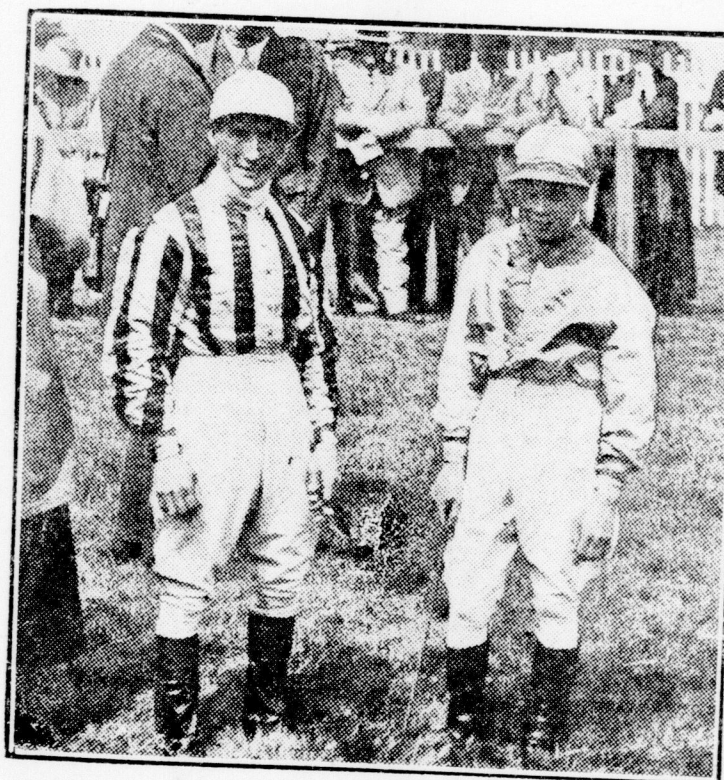
This informal photograph of Premier Herriot of France and Premier MacDonald of England was taken at the latter's country seat, "Chequers," where he entertained the French government head.

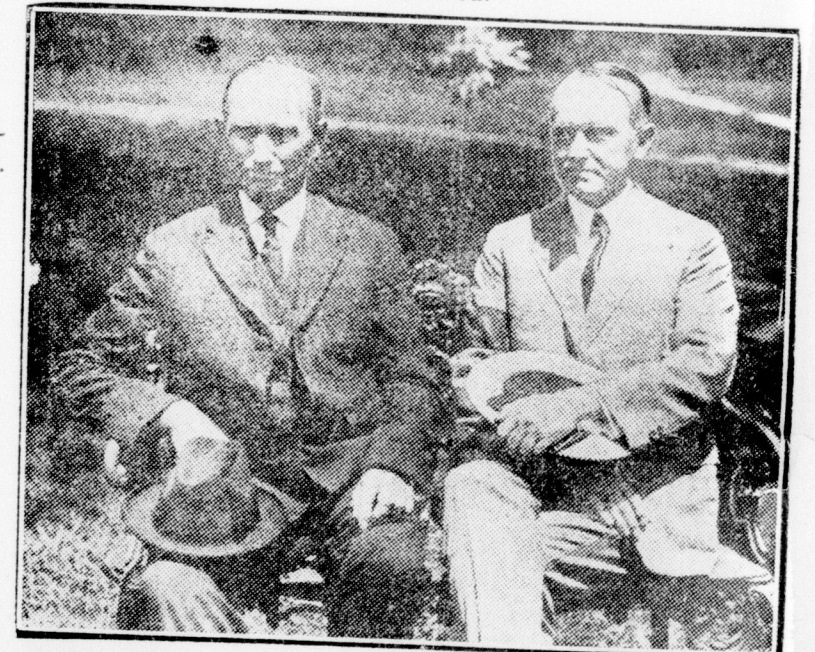
