MADRID, July 2.-A serious riot was caused to-day, by the popular feeling fgainst the new taxes on business transactions. Yesterday the Bourse showed their opposi-Yesterday the Bourse showed their opposition to the new law by declining to de any business. To-day the market men and women made a different and more disorderly demonstration. They formed a procession and marched through the streets, shouting and yelling, and in every way showing their disapprobation of the new law. The shopteepers closed their doors, fearing that the mob, which had attracted thousands of toughs and idlers, would end by pillaging their shops. The police, who interfered to keep order, were assailed. Finally the civil guard was called on to disperse the rioters, but met with unexpected Finally the civil guard was called on to disperse the rioters, but met with unexpected resistance. The crowd held their ground and met the charge of the guard with a shower of stones and other missiles. The command was finally given to fire. A volley was poured into the rioters and this ended the rioting. Many of the crowd fell into the streets with blood pouring from their wounds and the others fled. The wounded were picked up and placed upon improvised litters and carried to the hospitals. Some of them may die.
