

Isinglass, owned by Mr. McCalmont, is a bay colt by Isonomy—Deadlock, and was unbeaten as a two-year-old, though he only started thrice, in the Maiden Plate at Newmarket Second Spring, beating ten others; the Middle Park Plate, where he led home a field of fifteen, which included both the second and third in the Two Thousand. Ravensbury went to the post five times as a two-year-old, but only tanded one race, the Breeders' Produce, at Liverpool, in July. He is a bay colt by Isonomy—Penitent, and belongs to Mr. C. D. Rose. Raeburn, third in the Two Thousand, and third in the Derby, is a bay colt by St. Simon—Mowerina and is owned by the Duke of Pottland. As a two-year-old he was stripped half-a-dozen times, and in three races was
