Formal demand has been made upon Minister Squires for the protection due to United States citizens on United States territory, and Mr. Squires is conferring with President Palma.

United States residents on the island say they own and occupy more than two-thirds of the land there. They assert that the Cuban government is looting oppressive and unlawful taxes in the purchase and improvement of the island of Cuba.
