COUNTY COURT AT DALHOUSIE

His Honor Judge McLatchy Makes Fitting Remarks Upon Two Deaths

At the session of the County Court held at Dalhousie, His Honor Judge McLatchy spoke very feelingly on the deaths of Ex-Governor Hon. L. J. Tweedie and W. A. Trueman Barrister. He said that the late Mr. Tweedie was one of the leading lawyers of the province, a big man who had the interests of the province and particularly the North Shore at heart. His place would be hard to fill.

The late Mr. Trueman would also be greatly missed. A man of sterling qualities, he served his clients and his country well. His record was a most honourable one and he knew all would miss him.

The following cases were up for trial:

King vs McDonald. Stood over until next sitting of the court.

Hypolite Bujold vs Theopile LeBlanc. Acting on a judgement from Province of Quebec. Judgment reserved.

John C. Barclay vs Clarence Havard. Stood over owing to absence of Attorney General.

A number of other cases were on the docket, but by agreement these will be heard in Chambers by His Honor.

TRAFFIC BY-LAWS BEFORE COUNCIL

By-law for the Regulation of Street Traffic Passed. Effective Sept. 1st.

A meeting of the Town Council was held Friday evening last, His Worship Mayor Andrew presiding. Councillors Alexander, Quinn, McBeath, Evans, Champoux, Harquail, Patterson and Miller being present.

Minutes of last meeting read and confirmed.

A communication from F. M. Anderson stating that he had been over assessed on his Aberdeen Street property for some years and although he had previously taken up the matter he had not been able to have it rectified. Referred to Assessment and Appeals committee.

The matter of purchasing hose was discussed and the Fire Protection committee was authorized to purchase 750 feet of fire hose at best price.

The tenders for printing rules and regulations for the fire brigade were opened and the contract awarded to the Graphic, the lowest tenderer.

The Fire Protection committee was authorized to purchase six rubber coats and five pairs of rubber boots. Coun. Miller recommended that W. J. Walsh be given increase of pay to 30c. per hour.

Coun. Alexander, chairman of the By-laws and Legislation Committee submitted the By-laws for Prevention of Fires and Erection of Buildings, which were given the first reading.

The Traffic By-law was then brought up for a second reading.

Considerable discussion arose on the necessity of consolidating the various acts of the Legislature in reference to the Town of Campbellton, after which the council went into a committee of the whole to consider By-laws.

Upon reporting progress the Council adjourned.

HOW THE TRIBUNE GETS ITS CONTRACTS

Using Partisan Conservative Methods to Get Municipal Printing Contracts

Each year the Municipal Council which meets at Dalhousie in January instructs its Printing Committee to have the Annual Report in English and French printed for distribution to the ratepayers of the different parishes.

The Printing Committee of the Council was composed of Couns. D. A. Arsenau, of the Parish of Dalhousie, John Lawlor of Durham and William Copeland of Eldon.

Unfortunately Coun. D. A. Arsenau, chairman of the committee was ill at the time and Coun. Copeland was unable to attend a meeting of the committee held at Campbellton the day of the Conservative convention, consequently the duty of awarding the contract was left to Coun. Lawlor of Durham.

Coun. Lawlor who is one of the Conservative henchmen and a bitter partizan, called at the Graphic office early in the morning and asked our figures for the work. These which are as follows were given to Coun. Lawlor written on a sheet of paper:

English Reports, \$1.25 per page.
French Reports, \$1.35 per page.

These prices were 10 each page higher than the previous year to make up for increased cost of production.

A few days after the Graphic received a letter from Coun. Lawlor stating that as The Tribune's tender was lower than the Graphic's the contract had been awarded to that paper. This was entirely satisfactory to us so far as it went.

But what were the facts?

When the Municipal Council met at Dalhousie July 3rd and the Tribune's bill for printing these reports was read we found that his figures were as follows:

English Reports, \$1.24 per page.
French Reports, \$1.34 per page.

Will any of our readers even suggest that this is a coincidence?

Not at all. It is a barefaced job between Coun. Lawlor and the Tribune. How else could the Tribune know that our price was just one cent per page higher than his for both jobs?

It was a case of one conservative partizan doing another Conservative partizan a favor, according to their ethics in such matters, every thing is fair in an election contest. Coun. Lawlor in plain language told the Tribune what the Graphic's prices were.

If the Tribune is satisfied to get its contracts in such a despicable manner it is entirely welcome to them. As for the Graphic we are pleased to say that we are able to keep our presses running to capacity by honest and honorable means.

When the contract thus procured had to be printed the Tribune found that jobs out of town, the English report being printed in Fredericton and the French report in Moncton, whereas in former years the entire work was done in the Graphic office in Campbellton in the County of Restigouche.

WHAT'S THE MATTER WITH CAMPBELLTON

Are Our Young Ladies Uninterested in Helping to Win the War

Since the beginning of the war many splendid organizations have upheld the actual fighting of the men at the front, these organizations for the most part are of women. The girls have knitted, served at Red Cross teas, etc., but only rarely have they engaged in organized efforts of their own.

Much has been said of the need which at present exists for conservation of all foods and the preservation at once of perishable food-stuff. The Provincial Government has taken steps to assist and direct the girls of New Brunswick in the work of canning and preserving the fruits and vegetables which they have anxiously tender since first the call came to "grow your own vegetables."

Speakers have been heard in all prominent centres on this subject, Professor Peacock set forth the whole object in an interesting address in Campbellton during the last week of June. Now instructors are to follow the speakers, and to each center, wherever clubs have been formed, will come experts in Household Science to supervise the work and to teach the very best methods of preserving perishable food-stuffs.

In Campbellton one club of fifteen has been organized, with Miss Amanda Quinn as president, but there should be a town at this size be several clubs of fifteen. Prof. Peacock in a letter to the chairman of the committee, says:—

"Your membership, I notice, is not large as that of Charlottetown, where over 50 girls have enlisted. No doubt, however, your fifteen will do some recruiting work in the near future, and as the season develops the interest will grow."

This is not as it should be. We ought to have more girls interested in this splendid movement. In the near future Miss Knapp and Miss Prescott will be in Campbellton to direct the enterprise and we expect to show them that the young ladies of Campbellton are eager to do their part to "Win the War."

If you are willing to help in this thing up Miss Susie McPherson, who is in charge of the organizing during the chairman's absence, or speak to any of the Grammar School teachers.

Every club must have fifteen members—let us try to organize five clubs before the instructors arrive. When you have joined, get some one else to join.

SEVERE ELECTRICAL STORM HERE

Mrs. W. A. Trueman's House Struck and Damaged

A severe electrical storm passed over Campbellton Monday night between two and three o'clock and considerable damage was done.

The principal damage was done to the residence of Mrs. W. A. Trueman, in the west end of the town. The lightning struck the house, making a large hole in the roof and broke the plaster in the ceiling up stairs. Then the current entered the sewer pipe and followed it to the ground. This was split where it was riveted as neatly as if done with shears.

Mrs. Trueman, Mrs. Parker and Mr. Cantley as well as a servant were in the house at the time, but all escaped without injury although they received severe shocks.

Other houses, although not directly hit, felt the effect of the lightning. In some houses the electric bells were destroyed.

A little damage was done to the town electric system. A burnt out fuse in the transformer put all light and power in that district out of commission.

The display of electrical phenomena at the Round House was very brilliant and made things interesting in that locality for a brief time.

BOY DROWNED IN MILL RESERVOIR

Vincent Thompson, aged three years and five months, the bright little son of Mr. James Thompson of Richardsville was drowned in the reservoir which supplies water for the Richards mill Tuesday afternoon.

The reservoir is situated quite a distance off the main road on what is known as the Thompson road. A number of young boys were playing on the dam and bank when Thompson fell in. His companions who were all small, tried to rescue him but could not, then ran for help. When Pte. S. Murray, a returned soldier reached the scene he immediately plunged in and recovered the body, but life was extinct.

Coroner Martin was notified but after getting the particulars deemed an inquest unnecessary.

The bereaved parents have the sympathy of all.
