A COUNTRY GIRL'S FATE.

HER RAPID DOWNFALL AND AN UNEXPECTED GRAVE.

New Radio Number of Highway Not a Distant Prospect. ... Fatal Deeds—She Was Destroyed and Could Not Escape the Consequences.

On a cold morn'g in the City Morgue last night lay the remains of 19-year-old Katie Dunbar, a girl with pretty eyes, an abundance of brown hair and in her countenance a comely appearance. The face was pale, the eyes were closed, and the lips were set in a rigid smile. The police patrol wagon had just driven up to the front door, and a couple of shaven officers carried the body to the morgue and deposited it there, while a little crowd of curious men stood outside in the rain and eagerly asked each other for news concerning the girl's death.

The funeral was held in ordinary hallways of the city, the body was laid out in a simple coffin, and the service was held in a quiet and unobtrusive manner. The girl's death was a tragedy for her family, and the cause of her death was a mystery that had puzzled the police for some time.

On Friday, May 17, Katie Dunbar was visited at 122 King-street east by Mrs. Wright, a nurse and physician. ... The coroner, after issuing his warrant for an inquest, told the police the story of the death.

AGAINST A COMMISSION.

THE COURT HOUSE COMMITTEE WON'T HAVE ONE.

And Will Be Remitted to the City Council. ... A Strongly Expressed Opinion is Given by the Members of the Court House Committee and Judge McDougall.

The Court House Committee discussed the important question of the appointment of a commission to carry out the work of a special committee, and the members of the committee expressed their strong opposition to the proposal.

THE SLAYERS OF CRONIN.

AN ACCOMPLICE WHO WANTS TO TURN INFORMER.

Lake Dillon Talks—'Mack' Tells a Story Which May Lead to a Discovery—The Clan-na-Gael East—An Arrest Likely to Be Made Soon in Toronto.

Chicago, May 31.—It is reported that negotiations are pending between the state attorney and a well-known Chicago lawyer in behalf of a man, not yet arrested, but guilty of complicity in the murder of Cronin, in which he proposes to surrender himself to the authorities, tell the whole story, and bring all concerned to justice.

The man, who is believed to be an accomplice of the slayers of Cronin, has offered to turn informer and provide information that could lead to the discovery of other members of the Clan-na-Gael.

The authorities in Chicago are hopeful that the man's cooperation will lead to the identification and arrest of other individuals involved in the Cronin murder.

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DROWNED BY HUNDREDS.

BY THE CATASTROPHE IN A PENN. RIVER.

A Reservoir Above Johnstown Gires Way and Drivellings and Their Occupants are Swept Down by the Flood—Dead Bodies Seen Floating Down the River.

Pittsburg, May 31.—A sudden freshet in the North Fork River at Johnstown in the Allegheny Mountains has resulted in an awful catastrophe. The reservoir above the town broke about 5 o'clock this evening and the immense volume of water rushed down to the city carrying with it death and destruction.

Houses and hundreds of people were drowned. There is no communication with Johnstown, but a telegraph operator in the Pennsylvania Railroad tower at Sag Hollow, 15 miles this side of Johnstown, says at least 75 dead bodies have floated past. The wires are all down and no trains are running east of Blairsville, and no trains are west of Johnstown.

The rescue efforts are continuing, and the authorities are working to identify the victims of the disaster. The scale of the tragedy is unprecedented in the history of the region.
