London, June 7.—Two thousand German dead were left on the field in a terrible battle fought to the east of Tracy LeMont to-day after the Germans, pushing reinforcements by automobile from a point 50 miles distant, had directed a furious attack against the French lines in an effort to recapture two lines of trenches lost in the fighting of yesterday. The French captured here 250 prisoners and six machine guns. On the section between this front and Arras another sanguinary engagement was fought to sanguinary engagement was fought to the southeast of Hubvterne, where sever-al hundred German dead were found on the field after two German lines of trenches were taken, together with 400 prisoners. A large number of guns and muni-tions were included in the booty left in the French hands.
