At the last meeting of the Sackville Board of Trade Dr. Andrews declared that six hindred thousand dollars worth of beef is brought into the low er provinces every year because the armers of these provinces are unable to supple the demand The speaker thought that this was a very serious reflection upon the farmers of the low r provinces. Such a condition of hings should be remedied as speedil

as possible. One reason for the large importation f beef from abroad, no doubt is that many of our farmers do not take rough care to fatten the animals they slaughter and have the beef in a narketable state. It is poor policy to alf feed two animals and get no more com the sale than would be realized one carcass of weel fed beef. The 'slip-shod' never pays.
