CALLED AWAY.

Captain Rugh Chisholm is Numbered With the Bead.

Captain Ragh Chilabolm is Newbered With the Breef.

After three months of a lingering illness, an old and respected resident of Meaford in the person of Captain Hugh Chilabolm passed away recently. His partaer and help-mate in life preceded him to the tomb little more than one month ago, and the double bereavement falling upon the two sons and one daughter in so short a space of time has deeply moved the hearts of the community. To be bereft of father and mother within the period of five weeks is a trying affiliction which only those who pass through it are enabled to undestand. Captain Chisholm was born in Toronto township, on the centre road, four miles from Brampton, in the year 1824, and was consequently 72 pears of age at the time of his death. He was a brother of K. For over ten years he was lessee of the Meaford wharf and storehouse, in connection with which he did a lake trade.

The deceased was one of the pioneer ship builders and navigators of Canada, having served his apprenticeship with Rodney Gaulkins, a leading ship-builder of Cleveland, Ohio. Leaving Cleveland he built at Port Credit the first centreboard vessel constructed on the North Shore of Lake Ontario, called the Credit Chief.

Captain Chisholm was part owner and master of the steamship Her Majesty, which for two years ran regular trips between Toronto and Halifax, N.S. She was the first steamship to make regular trips between Toronto and Halifax, N.S. She was the first steamship to make regular trips between Ontario and Nova Scotia ports and was the pioneer in the inter-provincial trade. The last steamer the deceased built was the Favorite for the Meaford Transporation Co, now called the City of Parry Sound of the N.S. T. Co., and plying between Collingwood and North Shore ports.

In politics Mr. Chisholm was a prounced Conservative and always took an active part in forwarding the interests of his party. In religion he was a Roman Catholio, faithfully observing the practices and teachings of the Church and had a warm regard for Soctland and her traditions. Of a quiet, unassuming disposition, he naturally lead a retired life. As a citize and a man Am. Chisholm was held in the highest esteem, and it is safe to say he had not an enomy living. Like there in the world, but with that indomitable push and energy so characteristic of his nature he managed to pull through it all and to hand down to his children a noble example of a father's industry, honesty and self reliance.
