For the moment, therefore, the Agamemnon, Algiers, Terrible, Tribune, Fury, Beagle, Lynx, and Highflyer remained as a blockading squadron. The latter, however, was reported as about to cruise off Odessa.

LETTER FROM THE "TIMES" SPECIAL CORRESPONDENT.

The following extracts give the chief item of telligence up to the present time:-

Nov. 26.—The struggle between French and Russian riflemen, aided by artillery, was renewed last night as usual. The great bone of contention, in addition to the Ovens, is the mud fort at the Quarantine Battery, of which the French have got possession, though, truth to tell, it doe not benefit their position very materially. Liege rifles used by the Russians are very efficient weapons, but there is not much execution done, as the combatants fire entirely at the flashes of their opponent's weapons. We have altered the hours of reliefs, of despatch of ammunition to the trenches, &c., so as to bother the Russian artillerymen, who are generally wont to favour us with a salvo of shot about the time when they expect our waggons and men are moving down. The French are said to have spiked five guns in their rush inside Sebastopol, mentioned by me on the 24th. I mention this in order that you may not be misled by the rumour which has arisen out of this report to the effect that we have captured five field-pieces.
