

The Honourable Senator White, from the Standing Committee on Standing Orders, presented their fifth Report.

The same was then read by the Clerk, as follows:—

The Standing Committee on Standing Orders beg leave to make their fifth Report, as follows:—

Your Committee have examined the following petitions and find that the requirements of the Rules of the Senate have been complied with in all material respects, namely:—

Of Boisdore Panet-Raymond and one other of Montreal, Quebec, and others of Toronto, Ontario, and elsewhere; praying to be incorporated under the name of "The Association of Canadian Clubs."

Of Central Finance Corporation; praying for the passing of an Act changing its name to Household Finance Corporation of Canada, increasing its capital stock, and varying and clarifying its powers in certain respects.

Of the Quebec Railway, Light and Power Company; praying for the passing of an Act declaring and defining its powers with respect to the operation of auto busses and other conveyances.

All which is respectfully submitted.

The Honourable Senator Bourque, from the Standing Committee on Public Health and Inspection of Foods, to whom was referred the Bill (13), intituled: "An Act to amend the Food and Drugs Act," reported that they had gone through the said Bill, and had directed him to report the same to the Senate, without any amendment.

With leave of the Senate,

The said Bill was then read the third time.

The question was put whether this Bill shall pass.

It was resolved in the affirmative.

Ordered, That a Message be sent to the House of Commons to acquaint that House that the Senate have passed this Bill, without any amendment.

A Message was brought from the House of Commons by their Clerk with a Bill (8), intituled: "An Act respecting the Quebec Railway, Light and Power Company," to which they desire the concurrence of the Senate.

The said Bill was read the first time, and—

Ordered, That it be placed on the Orders of the Day for a second reading on Tuesday, next.

Pursuant to the Order of the Day, the Bill (G), intituled: "An Act for the relief of Stefano Guilio Luciano Roncari," was, on division, read the third time.

The question was put whether this Bill shall pass.

It was, on division, resolved in the affirmative.

Ordered, That the Clerk do go down to the House of Commons and acquaint that House that the Senate have passed this Bill, to which they desire their concurrence; also to communicate to that House the evidence taken in the case before the Standing Committee on Divorce, together with all the papers produced in evidence before them, with the request that the same be returned to this House.
