## WISCONSIN WOULD STOP FIGHT GAME

Reformers Want to Make It a Crime to Take in a Boxing Show.

MADISON, Wis., March 18.—The efforts of the radical reformers to abolish boxing in Wisconsin came before a joint legislative committee with a field day for both opponents and friends of boxing. The bill chiefly under discussion was that of Assemblyman Hansen, whose proposed bill seeks attendance at a boxing bout a crime, punishable by, in the case of a first offence, a fine of \$100, or imprisonment for a year, with the alternative of a fine, and a two-year sentence and a fine, either or both, for subsequent offences. This bill, it seems certain after today's hearing, will not be reported favorably. Instead, the probability is that amendments to the present bill, proposed by the author of the present measure, will be adopted to give the present commission more power. Only ministers who have never seen a boxing bout appeared in favor of making boxing or attendance at a fight a felony, and their claims that boxing is brutal were quickly nullified by their admission that they had never been spectators.

PARIS, March 18.—Baron Pierre de Coubertin, president of the International Olympic Committee, now in Lausanne, Switzerland, has written a letter to the Associated Press concerning the Olympic games in which he says: "I wish to repeat what I have already said, that the international committee of the Olympic games from the country to which the celebration has been given without consulting the country, and the sixth Olympic games remain, and will remain, that they will not be held in London. It is time it happened that it was not possible to celebrate the games, but they did not for this reason cease to exist. I consider all that is said and written on this subject now to be useless. The international committee will not allow a hand to be forced."

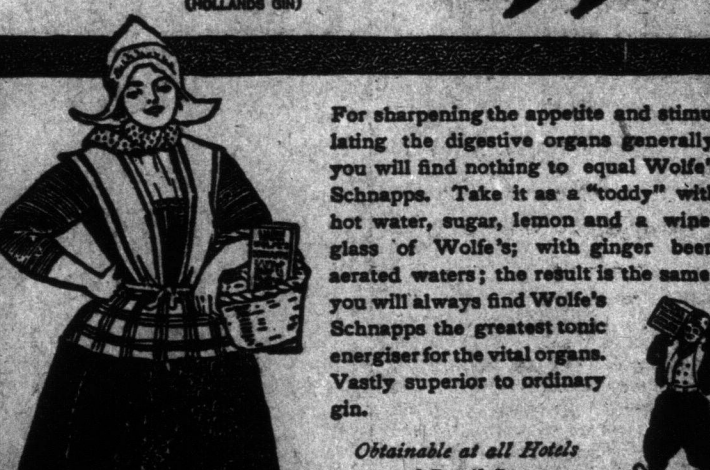
### A BILLIARD MATCH.
