

The spots of interest to be visited, besides the great Fall itself, are:—The Ground where the memorable Battle of Lundy's Lane was fought; the Whirlpool below the Falls; the Suspension Bridges; the Devil's Hole and the Bloody Run; the Queenston Heights, General Brock's Monument, Burning Spring, &c.

Follow the crowd and you cannot go wrong; there are also numerous ready and efficient guides, and, were these lacking, the roar of the great cataract would of itself be sufficient.
