## CHASING HIGH ONES LEAF'S FIRST WORK

### Chill Wind When Manager Gibson Trotted Candidates Out at Island.

## READING IS EIGHTH CITY IN LEAGUE

International Circuit is Announced—Leafs Open Season at Newark.

Newark, N.J., April 11.—The International Baseball League completed its eight-club playing circuit here today by awarding the Syracuse-Hamilton franchise to Reading, Pa.

Major Edward H. Filbert of Reading and a syndicate of business men secured the franchise by purchase, but President Puliz did not name the purchase price.

The Newark franchise was awarded to Pat Donovan, former manager of the Syracuse, but he has declined it. It was stated authoritatively that Donovan had obtained strong financial support from both sides of the street, but Donovan said he would manage the team himself, and he would not be a capitalist. No names were mentioned, but Donovan said he would manage the club would be announced after a meeting to be held here next week.
