On the decline they were sold to 8 1/2c and 8 3/4c, where shorts turned the market by their covering operations. The general situation remains unchanged and nothing at present in sight to cause us to alter our opinion. Traders will probably feel for the turning point on each little break, but will not hold long and will add to the weakness.

Corn and Oats—Course grains opened weak, but later rallied sharply on good buying. Local traders have found it profitable to sell the May option on all rallies for some time, but we anticipate that the time is near when they will pay higher prices for it.

Provisions—Small trade with no special feature worthy of note. Market closed steady.

### 81 CARLOADS AT CITY YARDS HIGHEST OF SEASON

They Sold at \$7 Per Cwt. Yesterday  
Choice Butchers' Cattle Scarce and Dearer.

Receipts of live stock at the city market were 81 car loads, composed of 1100 cattle, 2200 hogs, 145 sheep and 250 calves. The quality of fat cattle taken altogether was fair, but not as good as might be expected at this season of the year.

Trade was good, especially for the best grades of butchers' cattle, which sold readily at as high as higher prices than at any time this season.

Everything was quiet out early in the day. The main reason for an active market was that there was a large number of dealers from many outside places.

Deliveries were not large. Prices ranged from \$5.40 to \$5.80 per cwt. with one lot of 4 extra prime cattle at \$5 per cwt. The bulk would sell at about \$5.90 to \$5.75 per cwt., bulls at \$4 to \$4.40; cows at \$4 to \$4.50 per cwt.

**Butchers.**  
Choice picked lots sold at \$5.50 to \$5.75 per cwt.; loads of good at \$5 to \$5.25; medium at \$4.50 to \$5.25; common at \$4 to \$4.25 and cows at \$3.50 to \$4.50 per cwt.

**Feeders and Stockers.**  
The demand for good quality feeders and stockers was greater than the supply, many orders from farmers and dealers being unmet. Short-keep feeders, 1100 to 1200 lbs., each, sold at \$3.20 to \$3.50; feeders, 1000 to 1100 lbs., \$4.75 to \$4.85; good feeders, 800 to 1000 lbs., \$4.25 to \$4.50; medium feeders, 600 to 1000 lbs., \$3.75 to \$4.25; medium stockers, 500 to 700 lbs., \$3.25 to \$3.75; good stock, cows at \$3 to \$3.75; medium stock calves, \$3; common stock calves, \$2.75.

**Milk Cows.**  
About 20 milk cows and springers sold at \$30 to \$32 each.

**Veal Calves.**  
There are too many "bobs" and scrub calves light weights many of these being under the market standard of 60 lbs. when dressed, and too few of high quality calves that are wanted. Prices ranged from \$3 to \$8 each, or \$3 to \$4 per cwt. Extra choice calves would sell for more money.

**Sheep and Lambs.**  
Export sales at \$4.10 to \$5.25 per cwt.; backs at \$3.50 to \$4; choice yearling lambs at \$3 to \$3.75; common yearling lambs at \$2 to \$2.75; spring lambs at \$3 to \$4 each.

**Hogs.**  
Receipts were fairly large, over 2000 being brought. Mr. Harris reports the highest prices of the season, having sold \$7 per cwt. for select and \$6.75 for lights and fat, all and watered.

**AN EXPLOSION OF GAS MAKES BIG DEATH ROLL.**  
Huntington, W. Va., April 27.—Three persons were probably fatally injured, three others badly hurt, and at least two are buried under the ruins of the Messman building, which was wrecked today by a gas explosion which caused damage estimated at \$100,000. The explosion was the result of the ignition of the escaping natural gas.

### REVELLE WAS SOUNDED AT VETERANS' RECEPTION

George A. Payne (Chicken White) Waiting to Be Received by Earl Grey.



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The satisfaction felt by the Army and Navy Veterans yesterday morning at their cordial reception by Earl Grey was marred by a sudden illness attacking one of their members, George Allen Payne, and the news of his death at 4 p.m. intensified the sadness of his comrades. Mr. Payne was waiting at the King Edward Hotel to be presented when seized with the attack and was removed to the Emergency Hospital, but he never regained consciousness. Diabetes was the cause of death.

Deceased joined the artillery in Australia, and afterwards served in South Africa, where he joined Thompson's Horse. He served with Gen. Buller in the Zululand war and was present at the charge at Ulundi, and twenty years later, under the same leader, served in the Boer war, being at the river of Ladysmith. He belonged to the 17th Lancers, the "Death or Glory Boys," and wore the South African medal with seven bars, a rare distinction. He had been employed as night watchman by the Otto Hotel Co., but three weeks ago purchased a market garden on Wells Hill, where he purposed living with his mother, and last night was found to have been his last as watchman. He was 49 years of age and, besides his mother, leaves a married sister living at 109 Bathurst street. The funeral will take place on Saturday at Mount Pleasant. Rev. Mr. Williams of St. John's Church will conduct the service at the home, and the Army and Navy Veterans, who are requested to assemble at 2 o'clock sharp, will take charge at the graveside.

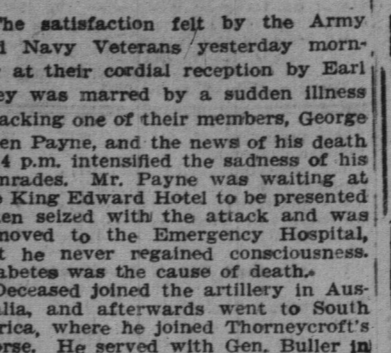
