WHO KILLED JACK ROBIN?

Minutes Lay Responsibility on Dunn,
Davies and Gowanlock

For Delay in Laying Bertram
Pipe—There Were Five Others
Who Would Have Done the Same
if They Had Had the Chance—
Controllers Fall Back on Experts
to Get Elevator Information—The
City Hall.

The burden of responsibility for the
delay in laying the fire-protecting pipe to
the Bertram ship yards rests on the
shoulders chiefly of Ald. Dunn and
Davies and of ex-Ald. Gowanlock. They
fought against granting Mr. Bertram's
request to a finish. They composed half
the Fire and Light Committee and thus
could negative any initiative motion.
Ald. Bowman, Traill, E. H. Graham,
Richardson and Woods were only less
obstructive because they had smaller
opportunity to be so. They were not
on the Fire and Light Committee, but
when Chairman Sheppard and Ald. Hub-
bard renewed the fight in Council during
the consideration of the estimates, they
opposed the item relating to this
piping to the extent of voting against it.
The minutes of June 3 read as fol-
lows:

Ald. Dunn, seconded by Ald. Woods
in amendment, moves that the report as
amended be not adopted, but that it
be further amended by striking out
the item "to extend Bathurst-street
main easterly to Bertram's ship yard,
1011 under the head Waterworks
Department" in Sub-section 2 of sec-
tion 2 of the estimates, upon which the
yeas and nays were taken as follows:

Yeas—Messrs. Bowman, Davies,
Dunn, Frame, Gowanlock, R. H. Gra-
ham, Richardson and Woods—8.
Nays—Messrs. Bryce, Burns, Crane,
Frankland, J. J. Graham, Hallam, Hub-
bard, Lamb, Leslie, Lynd, Saunders
and Scott—15.
Chief Engineer, seen last night, was
unqualified in his approval of the ef-
forts of Ald. Sheppard, who after try-
ing to effect an agreement between Sir
Frank Smith, Mr. Bertram, the City
Trunk and the city to jointly meet the
cost of the main, succeeded when he
failed in doing this with Ald. Hubbard
in rallying the appropriation through
Council. He is inclined to be lenient,
however, with Ald. Dunn's view that
the action would create a bad precedent.
He confesses that the work of fire
quenching was impeded by the obstruc-
tions met with through the delay in
main. There was one line of hose 1600
feet long, and when it is considered that
14 pounds pressure is lost by friction
every 100 feet, the disadvantage was
obvious. The Chief feels that he
could have prevented at least a good
part of the destruction had the pipe
been under instead of above ground.
He places Mr. Bertram's loss at \$50,000.

'him' 10 years later.
