THE ALASKA BOUNDARY.

A Belief in Washington That an Acceptable Temporary Arrangement Has Been Made.

Washington, Oct. 4.—The British Embassy was re-established here to-day, after having been located at Newport through the summer. This permits the resumption of personal exchanges on the Alaska boundary question, and during the day Mr. Towse, the British charge d'affaires, had a talk with Secretary Hay in relation to the matter. The opinion was expressed to-day by those officials most familiar with the question that the most friendly arrangement reached between Mr. Hay and Mr. Towse would be acceptable to all parties concerned. Canada included in the final boundary, this, however, relates to the temporary boundary and does not touch the question of how the permanent boundary shall be delimited. The negotiations at present seem to be proceeding on a friendly understanding on this permanent condition. Lord Pauncefote, the British Ambassador, had expected to return to Washington on Oct. 21, but his plans have now been changed so as to take the steamer on Nov. 3, reaching here Nov. 7.

Junction Town Council Will Hold a Special Meeting To-night

GUN CLUB SHOOT THIS AFTERNOON.

Other Interesting Items Gathered Yesterday From All Over the County of York.

Toronto Junction, Oct. 4.—(Special.)—Rev. H. Vincent has issued invitations to the members of his congregation to attend a social in St. John's schoolhouse next Monday evening.

The Public Library Board met this evening to ratify the agreement with the Bank of Commerce in regard to the lease of the old library room. The board is making extensive improvements to the library, both in the matter of shelves and new books. The library will be opened to-day by a special meeting to-morrow night to introduce a draft agreement with the Toronto Railway Company for the running of the cars to the corner of Keele and Dundas-streets. It is probable that the agreement will not provide for a loop line via Keele-street and Hummerston-avenue and that Dundas-street will be double-tracked as far as possible.

The annual tournament of the Toronto Junction Gun Club to-morrow afternoon promises to be a very interesting event. The prizes offered are very handsome and useful, and some good shooting is expected. There are already 35 entries for the competition.

Weston.

Weston, Oct. 4.—(Special.)—Up to within the past week Weston has wonderfully escaped from the typhoid fever epidemic, which appears to be prevalent all over the province. Now the malady is reported in four houses.

The plans and specifications for the new electric light plant were placed on view to-day, and four Toronto firms sent men to make estimates. The tenders for the work will be opened at a special meeting of the council on Tuesday.

Mr. Burke of Toronto Junction is wanted to answer a charge of taking a basket from the house of Mr. Lyon's store within a playful mood. The law, however, does not treat the matter as a joke, and a charge of stealing has been entered.

Newmarket.

The recent fair proved a growing one for the town, and it is estimated that over \$100 will be added to the cash balance on Monday evening. The annual meeting will be held on Saturday next to close up this year's business, and it is expected that the meeting will be attended by a large number of people.

A warrant has been issued by Magistrate E. Jackson for the arrest of John Houser. The charge is one of the theft of a boat on the Holland River from one Willis Hodges. Constable Somerville has the case in hand.

The local police are looking for a horse thief who stole a bay mare from Orilla on Monday evening. The animal was seen in charge of a man near Bradford on Tuesday evening. The horse weighs about 1200 pounds, and has the right hind leg swollen.

The high-grade wines in the cellar of Postmaster-general Mulock were disturbed on Friday night last by burglars. The thieves secured an entrance to a wing of the house by cutting away a shutter and opening a window. The caretaker, in charge of the residence was not aroused by the burglars.

Lomberton of the Olympia to take that vessel to Boston, where she will be extensively repaired at the navy yard.
