

ADMIRAL SEYMOUR IN THE TRENCHES

Germans and Russians Suffered the Heaviest Losses in the Fighting Around Tien Tsin Against Chinese Regulars.

Gun Fire of British and American Marines Was Part of a Good Day's Work—The Relieving Force—Seymour's Men Fought 15 Days—On Short Rations 10 Days.

London, June 28.—(4 a.m.)—The casualties of the international force attacking Tien Tsin were the following: Americans killed 3, wounded 2; British killed 2, wounded 1; Germans killed 15, wounded 27; Russians killed 10, wounded 27. The gun fire of the British and American forces was the heaviest.

NATIVE CHRISTIANS BUTCHERED

Massacres in the Inland Districts Which Rival the Armenians—Other Despatches from Shanghai Retate the Announcements of the Massacres of Native Christians in the Inland Districts.

London, June 28.—A telegram from Jardine, Matheson & Company, dated Shanghai, this afternoon, suggests that the Ministers are still at Peking, but admits that there is no news from the capital. The telegram adds: "Seymour arrived at Tien Tsin with 312 of his force wounded, besides 62 killed. The damage done to Tien Tsin has been much exaggerated."

MEANS A DECLARATION OF WAR

If the Foreign Ministers at Peking Were Formally Handed Their Passports.

London, June 28.—(7 p.m.)—A representative of the Associated Press was informed at the Foreign Office this afternoon that the Secretary of the British Legation at Shanghai had been received, June 25, an Imperial receipt as follows: "The Legation at Peking continues as usual to receive every protection from the Imperial Government."
