Rome, Aug. 4.-The conclave, after being in session for four days, elected Giuseppe Sarto, Patriarch of Venice, as Pope to succeed Leo XIII., and he now reigns at the Vatican and over the Catholic world as Pius X. Tonight all Rome is illuminated in his honor. His election and the assumppressive ceremonies at the Vatican which only ended this evening. To morrow the new Pope, clad in all his full Pontifical robes and with all the ritualistic ceremony will receive the members of the diplomatic corps, the cardinals and the bishops, who will then offer official homage, this, notwithstanding the fact that twice to-day the cardinals and many high officials of the Vatican went thru a similar

Coronation Aug. 9. The date upon which the coronation of Pius X will occur has not yet been officially decided, but the impression prevails that it will take place Aug. 9. Altho the election was over at 11 o'clock this morning and was announced to the world 45 minutes later, by the appearance of the new Pope, at the window of St. Peter's, the con-clave was not formally dissolved until 5.30 this afternoon. The cardinals then returned to their various apartments in Rome, with the exception of Cardinals Oregila and Rampolla, who temporarily retain their official suits in the Vaticas, and Cardinal Herrero y Espinosa, who is too ill to be movy Espinosa, who is too ill to be moved for several days. It was to the sick cardinal that the new Pope paid his first visit after being formally proclaimed Pontiff. The cardinals will remain in Rome for to-morrow's ceremonies, and should the coronation be fixed for next Sunday, they are rot likely to return to their respective homes until after that ceremony.
