Major Marchand left Fashoda on Sunday, and arrived at Khartoum yesterday morning. He will start for Cairo today. As the other Frenchmen remain at Fashoda, Major Marchand's departure from there is not regarded as a settlement of the question as to the possession of that place, which is in dispute between Great Britain and France.

# THE DEATH

Describe His Condition.

London, Oct. 29 .- The coroner's inquest into the death of Mr. Harold Frederic, the newspaper correspondent and novelist, who died at Henley, Surrey, on last Wednesday, was resumed on Wednesday. Mrs. Mills, the leader of the Christian Scientists, who treated Mr. Frederic according to the peculiar methods of that sect, was called as a witness. She is a robust, swarthy, middle-aged American. She testified concerning the treatment which she applied to Mr. Frederic. She said she did not allow patients to take drugs or a doctor's orders, because they could not swing between matter and mind. The patient could not describe the physical condition of Mr. Frederic. She had not diagnosed his material sickness. Mrs. Mills told the coroner that his God was finite, and her God infinite. If she should fall down and break her leg, God would take care of the fractured limb.

Lawyer Mathew, on behalf of Mr.

Frederic's executors, cross-examined the witness, and got answers similar to the foregoing. He warned her that she was in a serious position.

Mrs. Mills said she charged her patients a guinea a week if they could afford to pay that sum. She had no idea that taking Mr. Frederic for a drive a few days before his death was the worst thing that could have been done at the time.

The taking of testimony has not yet been finished. The inquest was adjourned for a week. The coroner read Mr. Frederic's will, which is dated Aug. 17. One of the witnesses of the will testified that Mr. Frederic was perfectly sane at the time the will was witnessed.

#### **GETTING ALONG**

The U. S. Peace Commissioners at Paris Making Some Progress.

Washington, Oct. 28.-The president was enabled to lay before the cabinet today very encouraging reports from Paris regarding to the progress of the peace negotiations. The administration now fully believes that the negotiations in be concluded much sooner than was expected from the outlook a few days ago. It can be stated authoritatively that the commissioners have not yet actually begun the discussion of the Philippines question, and that it will not be taken up until next week. Since the Spaniards have found that the American commissioners mean exactly what they say, and that their presentation of the side of the United States is really an ultimatum, the use-less, prolonged debate, it is said, has become apparent to the Spanish, and it is now believed that the Philippines discussion will be less protracted than

expected some days ago. The recent action of the United States Government in intimating that the negotiations were proceeding much too slowly, has had its effect upon the Spanish commissioners, and they are not likely to debate the remaining propositions to the length they did the settlement of the Cuban debt. The United States has not assumed or guaranteed the so-called municipal debt of Cuba or Cuban municipalities but it is expected that such debts will be paid by the municipalities incurring them, for by no reasoning could they be charged upon Spain.

The United States Government, it is said in official circles, would look upon any attempt at evading the payment of such debts as dishonest, and whatever government is established in Cuba will be expected to see that these obigations are carried out in good faith. Moreover, some of the bonds of Cuban municipalities are held by citizens of the United States, and States might insist that the investments of her citizens in such securities are made good. The state department has no information as to the amount of these municipal liabilities.

# DOCTOR SENT DOWN

A Jury at Barrie Found Him Guilty of Wronging a Girl.

Barrie, Oct. 29 .- D. B. Johnston, a traveling spectacle vendor and eye doctor, from Toronto, was given three years in the penitentiary Justice Meredith for criminal assault on a young girl about 15 years of age. The prisoner took the girl away from her home, near Thornton, on Aug. 21, telling her mother that he would take her to Toronto and get her a place. Instead of doing this he drove north towards Hillsdale, and it was on the road that he is alleged to have committed the offense.

The prisoner denied the story point-He was defended by T. Robinette. and William Lount, Q.C. conducted the prosecution. The judge. in his charge, indicated that he did not think the assault had been committed, but the jury decided otherwise, and after being out over two hours, brought in a verdict of guilty shortly after midnight. Johnston has a wife and one child.
