

ROAMER AN EASY WINNER IN BIG SARATOGA EVENT

Clipped 21-5 Seconds From
Track Record Established
Four Years Ago.

Saratoga, N. Y., Aug. 2.—Andrew Miller's Roamer ran to immortal fame here yesterday before the largest crowd that yet has attended a mid-week opening at the Saratoga racetrack. The mighty son of Knight Ocean and Rose Tree won the Saratoga handicap in record time. Without a touch of whip or spur, he sped over the mile and a quarter in the phenomenal time of 2:02 1-5, clipping one and four-fifths seconds from the track record, which he established four years ago.

It was the third time the gelding won the famous stake, and the second time he hung up a new record in the event. As a 4-year-old he was returned the victor in the record time of 2:04 2-5, and last year, as a 5-year-old he led a big field over a full track in the fast time of 2:06 1-5. 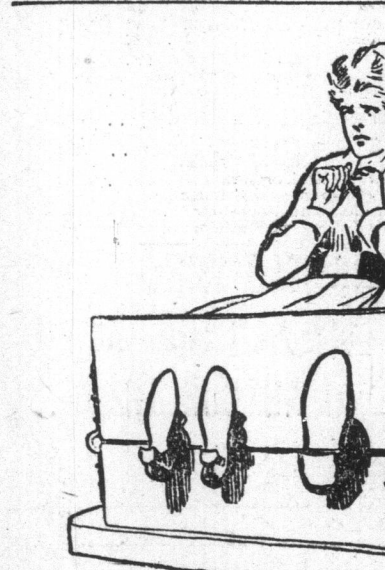

Roamer Won Easy.
In winning yesterday, Roamer did everything a great horse could do. He carried 125 pounds, met worthy opposition and came from behind in record time. Commander Ross Cudgel, whose performance earlier in the year had earned him the crown which today was placed on the head of Miller's gelding, ran a great race, too, but the best he could do was to take second end of the \$7,000 purse.

Roamer was too fast for Cudgel and beat him home by three lengths. Mrs. James Arthur's Bondage finished third, two lengths further back. They were staggering as they crossed the line, and so were Fairy Wand, War Cloud and Priscilla Mullins, which finished in the order named, far in the rear.

Roamer Wins Race.
To describe the race needs only a few words. Fairy Wand, with only 98 pounds up, sped to the front as soon as the starting gun was fired, and was away to a perfect start. She sprinted at a terrific pace, and going down the back stretch was three lengths ahead of her field. Roamer was inside position, romping along under a stout pull. Rounding the turn, Robinson gave Roamer his head and the race was decided in the next 50 yards. When the home stretch was reached Roamer was at Fairy Wand's saddle girth and bent on going faster. When the final eighth pole was reached Roamer was far in front and going away from his field.

At the sixteenth pole he was three lengths ahead and then Robinson began to ease him up. While he was stepping along leisurely the remainder of the distance, Fairy Wand was faltering badly, but Cudgel and Bondage were exerting every ounce of speed and strength in an endeavor to catch the leader. Their efforts were in vain, for Roamer could not be caught by them or any other horse on the American turf.

PASTORS SHOULD NOT SPECULATE

New York, Aug. 1.—The suit brought by the Rev. Dr. Newell Dwight Hillis, pastor of Plymouth Church of Brooklyn, against Frank L. Ferguson, former president of the Plymouth trustees, was decided in the clergyman's favor today. Mr. Ferguson acted as business administrator in Dr. Hillis' numerous business enterprises, including the purchase of Canadian timber lands.

The referee, William D. Dickey, held that Mr. Ferguson owes Dr. Hillis \$70,000, and that various claims which Mr. Ferguson put in for services and expenses, aggregating about \$35,000, were not justified. The referee added: "The temptation is strong to preach a sermon on the impropriety to use harsher words, of ministers, while they are ministers, engaging in any speculative business, where the speculation is to be carried on with money of others, who intrusted their earnings to a minister because he is a minister, relying on everything that belongs to the ministerial office."

MANUFACTURERS ARE TAKING ADVANTAGES OUT OF PROPORTION

Railway War Board Shows
Price Increases.

FROM 32 TO 200 PER CENT

Idea of Comparison Seems To
Be To Justify Railway
Rates.

MONTREAL, Aug. 1.—The Canadian Railway War Board announces that a detailed study has been undertaken which will show the merely the increase in the cost of railway haul in the manufacture of necessities of life, but will go into the actual cost of labor and raw material in the articles, with a view to proving that while railway rates have increased probably 30 per cent since the war began, while railway cost of operation has increased by a larger percentage, manufacturers have actually increased their rate of profit out of all proportion to the actual increase in their cost of production. The war board gives the following list: Boots and shoes have risen in price since the war began, 100 per cent; beef, 25 per cent; clothing, 50 per cent; coal, 100 per cent; cordwood, 100 per cent; flour, 90 per cent; gasoline, 100 per cent; hardware, 100 per cent; pork, 75 per cent; sugar, 80 per cent, and tobacco, 60 per cent. The roads are paying now a 100 per cent higher payroll; 210 per cent more for axes; 110 per cent more for brass castings; 200 per cent more for malleable castings; 100 per cent for coke; 157 per cent for iron and steel bars; 153 per cent for fire; 50 per cent for oak; 100 per cent for pine and spruce; 130 per cent for oil fuel at Montreal; 32 per cent for oil fuel at Vancouver; 30 per cent for kerosene; 135 per cent for steel tires; 100 per cent for cleaning waste; 200 per cent for lubricating waste, and 90 per cent for cast iron wheels.

STRIKERS FIRE UPON DEPUTY SHERIFF AT RIORDAN PULP PLANT

Hold Bridge at Hawkesbury, Quebec, and Block Passage.

HAWKESBURY, P. Q., Aug. 1.—Taking possession of the bridge leading to the Riordan pulp mills here last night, 150 strikers refused to allow persons to pass in either direction, a riot almost being precipitated. Deputy Sheriff Wright of L'Orignal, was fired upon three times during the evening, the bullets passing through the cover of his automobile.

About 7 o'clock Magistrate Lawlor arrived from his summer camp and immediately got a committee of the strikers before him and warned them that action would be taken against them at once. They agreed to a truce until Friday of this week.

The trouble seems to have arisen from the allegation that the company does not and will not recognize the union. Some outside organizers are leading the strikers, who number one hundred and fifty. Six hundred employees refuse to join the union.

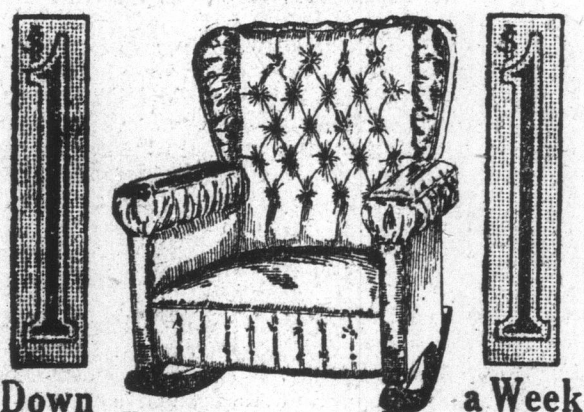
