LONDON, Oct. 31.—(10:50 p.m.)—High placed German officials at Copenhagen this afternoon received information that the German Emperor had abdicated, according to the Copenhagen correspondent of the Exchange Telegraph Company, who adds: "Nothing is said about the crown prince."

### SWISS GOVERNMENT REDUCES NUMBER OF TROOPS TO MINIMUM

Eight Battalions Are Retained To Prevent Smuggling.

Basel, Oct. 31.—It is officially announced by the Swiss Government that the number of troops with the colors is being reduced to a strict minimum. The majority of those retained, about eight battalions, are posted along the frontiers to prevent smuggling and espionage, in conformity with economic agreements binding Switzerland not to export raw materials which have been

imported into this country. This cordon of troops must be maintained, even in the event of an armistice, and perhaps for some time after the conclusion of peace, to prevent Swiss stocks of food-stuffs being sent abroad.

### ALLIED FLEET PERMITTED ENTRANCE TO DARDANELLES

Immediate Liberation of All Allied Captives—Gen. Townshend Freed and Allowed to Carry Offer of Turks to the Allies.

LONDON, Oct. 31.—Sir George Cave, home secretary, in the House of Commons today, announced the terms of the Turkish armistice which are now in operation. They include free passage of the Allied fleet in the Dardanelles and immediate repatriation of British war prisoners. The armistice was signed at noon today, and is an unconditional surrender.

### GENERAL TOWNSHEND FREED

LONDON, Oct. 31.—General Townshend, the British commander, captured at Kut-el-Amara, was liberated several days ago by the Turks, Sir George Cave, the home secretary, announced in the House of Commons today in order to inform the British admiral in command in the Aegean that the Turkish Government asked that negotiations be opened immediately for an armistice.

A reply was sent that if the Turkish Government sent fully accredited plenipotentiaries Vice-Admiral Calthorpe, the British commander, was empowered to inform them of the conditions upon which the Allies would agree to stop hostilities, and could sign an armistice on those conditions on their behalf.  
The Turkish plenipotentiaries arrived at Mudros, Island of Lemnos, early this week, and an armistice was signed by Admiral Calthorpe on behalf of the Allied governments last night. It will come into operation at noon today.

### SOON FOLLOWED HUSBAND.

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 31.—Mrs. Wilfred Ketchew, widow of the late Wilfred Ketchew, who died on Monday, passed away at St. Thomas on the last night, according to word received by her brother-in-law, W. M. Ketchew, Curtis street. The funeral was held this afternoon from the parlors of C. A. Towers, undertaker. Interment took place in St. Thomas Cemetery.  
The deceased was widely known, and will be missed by a wide circle of friends. She was only taken ill a week ago.

### NUXATED IRON

### STORES MAY CLOSE ON SATURDAY NIGHT

Great Crowds of Week Ago Were Dangerous.

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 31.—In order to take every precaution against the spread of the influenza, local stores may be asked to close their doors at 6 o'clock on Saturday evening. The board of health has no authority to compel stores to close, yet the crowds were so great on Saturday night last that it is felt that the storekeepers might be asked to close of their own free will for the purpose of combating the dread disease.  
Theatres, poolrooms and all public gatherings cancelled, it is said that having nowhere else to spend the evening, large crowds of citizens on Saturday night last visited the various stores along Talbot street. The danger of spreading the disease is just as great there as in a theatre or public gathering, and some move will undoubtedly be made this week. Chairman Hookway is out of the city at the present time, but as soon as he returns he will be asked to call a meeting of the board to consider the advisability of such a move.

**MUNCEY YOUTHS APPEAR.**  
ST. THOMAS, Oct. 31.—A couple of young Muncey youths appeared today before County Magistrate Hunt, and were found guilty of stealing a pocket knife and other small articles. The county magistrate, however, looked lightly on the offence, and ordered the relatives of the boys to produce sureties. He then bound them over to keep the peace and allowed them to go on payment of the court costs.  
**ENLISTED AT COAST.**  
WATFORD, Oct. 31.—Pte. Charles Lawrence, son of Mrs. Harry Durston, has been reported killed in action. He enlisted in British Columbia. Two brothers, Roy and George, of the 149th, are overseas now.

### BAD ORGANIZATION CAUSED DELAY IN PLANE CONSTRUCTION

Investigation Into Airplane Production in United States Is Completed.

Washington, Oct. 31.—The long-awaited report on the aircraft investigation conducted during the last five months by Charles E. Hughes and Attorney-General Gregory was placed before President Wilson yesterday by the attorney-general.

"Delays and wastes of the production program, the report declares, were due chiefly to 'the defective organization of the work of aircraft production and the serious lack of competent direction of that work by the responsible officers of the signal corps.'"

No fault is found with the management of aircraft affairs since the reorganization of last May, which placed John D. Ryan in charge.  
The report finds no "graft" in the generally accepted sense, but makes recommendations for proceedings against army officers held guilty of dealing with corporations in which they were interested.

Mr. Hughes, in his report, referred to the retention by Henry Ford of Carl Ende, as chief of his drafting department, despite charges against Ende of pro-German utterances. He said there were indications of a laxity at the Ford plant with respect to those of German sympathies which was not at all compatible with the interests of the Government.

### DREADED EPIDEMIC IS SUGGESTING TO DOCTORS

ST. THOMAS, Oct. 31.—According to reports from the health authorities today there is absolutely no change in the influenza situation. It has not changed either for the better or worse, according to Inspector Shaw, and he states that while the ban on public gatherings will not be lifted for some days yet there is no need for alarm.  
There was one death in the city today, but the deceased had been ill for a couple of weeks or more, so that this fact does not alter the outlook. There are a few new cases reported, but the number of recoveries are equal to the new cases, so that the situation remains the same as it was yesterday.  
Medical men in the city, without exception, however, are quite optimistic, and are looking forward to the disease being absolutely under control in a few days more.

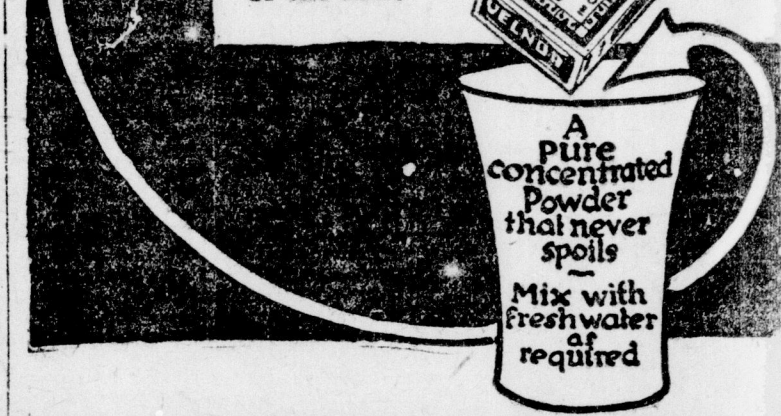
