SINN FEINERS URGED TO SEIZE BRITISH INSTITUTIONS IN IRELAND

EIGHTY DELEGATES WILL BE IN ATTENDANCE AT SESSIONS AT THE VERSAILLES CONGRESS

Smaller Powers Who Declared War On Germany Will Have Three Representatives, While Those Nations That Broke Off Diplomatic Relations Will Have One Each.

Paris, Jan. 9.—It is probable that there will be eighty delegates at the peace congress if the program presented to the delegates today by the French Government is approved by the supreme council. There will, in addition, be extra delegates from most of the nations represented. These will be called into the congress upon special subjects upon which they are experts and are under consideration. It is probable that Lord Hardinge, former viceroy of India, Sir Louis Mallet, British ambassador to Turkey, and Sir Esme W. Howard, British minister to Switzerland, will appear for Great Britain as extra delegates. Bernard Baruch, Vance McCormick, and other specialists, will be called upon by the United States peace commission.

WIRELESS SERVICE IS BACK ON PEACE BASIS

GENERAL STRIKE IS DECLARED IN THE ARGENTINE

200 Casualties Are Reported in Clash at Iron Works.

Buenos Ayres, Jan. 10.—A general strike has been declared throughout Argentine Republic at midnight.

Reports early tonight show that there have been more than 200 casualties as a result of the disorders incident to the general strike. Disorders were reported today from virtually every part of the city, but the most serious fighting was at the Vasena Iron Works, where troops and strikers clashed.

DELAY IN ARRIVAL OF DELEGATES HAS DEFERRED CONGRESS

Preliminary Conversations Will Open On Saturday, It Is Expected.

WILSON IS DISAPPOINTED

Six Weeks of Conferences Likely Necessary To Establish Unanimity.

Paris, Jan. 10.—(By the Associated Press).—After nearly a month of waiting and preparation, conversations which will lay the foundations of the actual peace congress are about to start. American delegates, who are now in the city, are expected to arrive on Saturday.

As many of the principal questions to be thrashed out in preliminary conversations are of a technical nature, it is expected that the congress will be able to get on with the main business of the peace conference.

The British have brought over from England a highly developed machine which is virtually ready to function. Even the elevator conductors and porters are men who have been tested out in the service of the British Government and whose dependence has been established. The Japanese will have to organize after reaching here, as will the Belgians and other minor belligerents.

Disappointed at Delays.
President Wilson's feeling on coming to Europe as early as he did, was that all the entente governments had made their preparations to get down to talking. It is not an overstatement to say that the delay in the arrival of the American delegates is a disappointment to him.

LLOYD GEORGE AND CLEMENCEAU AGREE ON "FREEDOM OF THE SEAS"

Satisfactory Understanding Is Reached On Vital Question By British and French Premiers.

London, Jan. 9.—Messages from Paris indicate that Premier Clemenceau and Lloyd George have scored a great success on the question of the freedom of the seas, and that very little is likely to be said thereon when the actual peace conference assembles.

MEN ENCOURAGED SHIP'S STEWARD TO SELL THEM FOOD

So Declares Purser Richards at the Northland Inquiry.

TRIP WAS SATISFACTORY

Officials See No Reason For Complaints of Returned Soldiers.

Ottawa, Jan. 10.—Evidence of the Northland officers were continued this morning. Purser Richards taking the stand at the resumption of the inquiry, followed by Chief Officer Hutchinson and the chief engineer.

Proceeding with the witness, Mr. Justice Hodgins referred to a statement issued by the White Star-Dominion Line officials in the morning newspaper to the effect that they were completely satisfied with the trip of the Northland. In view of the fact that Northland officers were here to give evidence the statement from the officials placed the line in a very extraordinary position.

Mr. Holden, White Star Line counsel, expressed concurrence in the view of the court. He had already drawn the attention of his client to the improbability of such a statement. The interview must have emanated from a very subordinate official.

Purser Richards was then recalled. He said he had received no specific complaints. He had no reason to think the voyage had been other than satisfactory. Witness had discussed with the chief steward the matter of stewards selling food to soldiers, and had also made periodical inspection of the ship. He found no evidence of water selling, but said the privates had encouraged the traffic with the stewards, which made it more difficult to stop.

It is the stewards' food they could only obtain it by stealing it from the main galley. Troop details sent to the main galley for rations would get whatever they asked for, and if they could carry it would get the full ration for 100 men if they asked for it.

Mr. Orde—"Still satisfied with the voyage?"

To the judge witness said the stewards on the ship were paid \$10 a month. As a class they were not as competent as in pre-war days. He had no reason to think there should be any shortage of water in the daytime. All taps were turned off at 4 o'clock because of frost. The ship was victualled to the scale hitherto used for Canadian troops, and ample supplies were provided for conveying food.

NEWSPRINT PRICE SET ON ONE-SIDED BASIS OF COSTS

Advance of \$8 Per Ton Is Reached by Controller On Portion of Facts Only.

COMPARISONS SUBMITTED

Increase in Costs of Production Considered Decrease Is Overlooked.

Ottawa, Jan. 10.—Before the paper control tribunal today, W. N. Tilley, publishers' counsel, dealt with the \$8 per ton increase in newsprint prices awarded by Controller Pringle July 1 of last year, onward, in attacking the propriety of this increase.

As to wood costs Mr. Tilley pointed out that the increase was based on use of 1917-18 wood, whereas reports of Government Auditor Clarkson show that neither Canadian nor American pulp mills had increased their output of wood at that time.

Proceeding to deal with the Port of Spain mills, which Mr. Pringle had allowed an extra \$4 per ton by reason of high costs, Mr. Tilley asserted that the Canadian Paper Mills Company, which also operates paper mills on the United States side, the power is all generated on the Canadian side, but the Canadian mill has no sulphite department, so has to import sulphite from the United States at a cost of at least part of this. He also drew attention to what he claimed was a difference of \$6.21 between the costs of the two mills.

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SOCIALISTS MAKE POOR SHOWING IN BADEN ELECTIONS

Polled But 15,000 Votes Out of a Total of 1,000,000.

Copenhagen, Jan. 9.—Results of the elections to the National Assembly in Baden have been disappointing to Socialists, according to an admission made by the Freiheit of Berlin. Out of a total of 1,000,000 votes, the Socialists polled but 15,000, and failed to elect a single representative.

LONDONERS REACH HALIFAX TODAY ON HOSPITAL SHIP

Seven Hundred Wounded Men Arrive On the Araguay.

Halifax, N. S., Jan. 10.—The hospital ship Araguay, Capt. Barrow, with 700 wounded men on board, arrived here this morning.

Major Shillingford, docked this morning after a rough, though uneventful voyage, eleven days from Liverpool. Included in the list of patients are 100 mental cases, 15 cot cases, and 65 amputees.

The first train to get away will be that containing the mental cases, which is due to depart at noon. The second train, containing the men bound for the Toronto district, is scheduled to leave at 3 o'clock.
