200 Casualties Are Reported in Clash at Iron Works.

Buenos Ayres, Jan. 10.-A general strike has been declared throughout Argentine Republic at midnight.

Reports early tonight show that there have been more than 200 casualties as a result of the disorders incident to the general strike. Disorders were reported today from virtually every part of the city, but the most serious fighting was at the Vasena Iron Works, where troops and strikers clashed.

GOVT. TROOPS ORDERED TO SHOOT TO KILL. Berlin, Thursday, Jan. 9, 5:30 p.m.—(By the Associated Press). The Government forces are in complete control of that section of the inner city between the Brandenburg gate and Friederichstrasse. It has issued an order prohibiting all processions.

The Government has scored a decided victory in the capture of police headquarters, which has been one of the Spartacan strongholds. The building was taken by the Fusilier Guards after a short,

The Government forces took the building with few casualties. Eichshorn, the Spartacan police chief, escaped, but many of his supporters were made prisoner.

In issuing its order against processions, the Government gave 83.25; warning that its troops have orders to fire without waiting for the Spartacans to begin, and to shoot to kill.

The Spartacans apparently are losing hope. They failed to summon a mass meeting of their supporters today, and the streets are almost deserted. The streets of Berlin today were without even the usual small groups of disputants. The correspondent is informed that the Berlin regiment of mounted sharpshooters is supporting the Government enthusiastically, and that other troops in the city also are loyal.
