

King James and Jack Atkin Will Meet in Toronto Cup

Note and Comment

King James and Jack Atkin, two of the very best hand-on horses on the continent, are coming to the Woodbine track for the Toronto Cup on the closing day of the O.J.C. meeting, Thursday, May 21. King James won last year and arriving and leaving the day of the race.

These two met in the Metropolitan Handicap, Jack Atkin running third to Fashion Plate and Prince Imperial. The time, 1:27 4/5, was a record for King James, while the sharp eye of the Sals horse was the best in the race, meeting with luck and running wide.

The Toronto Cup is just the same as last year's Metropolitan, viz., 2000, and the presence of these tracks will further stimulate the Toronto Cup as one of the recognized open classes of the year.
