

MOLDING THE SULTAN DOWN

And John Bull is the Boy That's Doing It. CONCESSIONS BOTH WAYS

Appears to be the Determination of the Great Powers.

Occupation of Thessaly Will be Permitted, and 20,000,000 Will be Paid by Greece, Who Will be Back Members of the League of Nations.

London, May 28.—The correspondent of the Times at Athens says: "The despatches which the Government has received from the representatives of Greece abroad all indicate that the peace negotiations have taken a turn more favorable to Greece. Turkey's proposal to occupy Thessaly no longer receives any consideration owing to Great Britain's attitude, while the proposal to abolish the capitulations in the case of Greek subjects in Turkey is rejected and the suggested extradition treaty is apparently set aside."

What Does This Mean? A despatch to The Post from Constantinople says the Turkish Government has given orders for the forwarding of 20 battalions from Syria for service on the Serbian and Bulgarian frontiers, and that six transports sailed yesterday (Thursday) under sealed orders.

THE WOULD-BE REGICIDE.

Pietro Acciarito on Trial for His Attempt to Kill the King of Italy.

Rome, May 28.—The trial of Pietro Acciarito, the ironworker of Artagna, province of Udine, who attempted to stab King Humbert on April 22, while the king was on his way to the races, commenced today. The court room was crowded, and there were many ladies among those present.

The Steamer Ohio Ashore. Edinburgh, May 28.—The British steamer Ohio, Captain Gordon, from Boston to New York, was ashore ten miles north of Wick, in the northeastern part of Scotland, she went ashore in a dense fog. Efforts will be made to float her, but it is feared she is badly damaged.

The Kaiser Can't Go to Paris. Paris, May 28.—A number of people who have been interviewed by representatives of the German press in London during the exhibition of 1900, agree that the Kaiser will not visit Paris as long as the question of Alsace-Lorraine exists.

Bank of France Statement. Paris, May 28.—The weekly statement of the Bank of France, issued to-day, showed the following changes, as compared with the previous account: Notes in circulation, decreased 11,400,000 francs; treasury accounts current, increased 25,550,000 francs; gold in hand, increased 9,025,000 francs; bills discounted, increased 41,750,000 francs; silver in hand, decreased 525,000 francs.

John Redmond Suspended. And Other Obnoxious Irishmen Removed from the British Commons. London, May 28.—Mr. John Redmond, the Parnellite leader, was suspended in the House of Commons to-day owing to his persisting in an irregular discussion of the financial relations between Great Britain and Ireland. Mr. John J. Clancy, member for the north division of Dublin County; Mr. William Redmond, member for West Clare, and other obnoxious Irishmen were also removed from the Commons.

Co-operation Didn't Work. Paris, May 28.—Forty workmen have left the co-operative glass works that were started by the socialists at Carmentis about a year ago, and have applied to a glass manufacturer and capitalist to re-employ them. They declare that the pay of the men at the co-operative works is months in arrears, that the capital of 500,000 francs, which was obtained by means of a lottery, is exhausted, and that the society is heavily in debt.

The members of the Property Committee visited the cattle market yesterday morning to inspect the improvements there. They were highly pleased with Commissioner Costow's work, and had an experience that they will not soon forget.

Brunswick Avenue Payment. The property owners on Brunswick Avenue are saving a hot fight over a payment. The recommendation for a cedar block pavement has passed the Board of Works, but a deputation in favor of brick visited the Mayor yesterday and argued that the petition for a block pavement was not a representative one. The Mayor will consult the Engineer about the matter.

The City's Health. Up to date the number of infectious diseases reported to Dr. Sibbard for the present month are as follows: Diphtheria 71, scarlet fever 307, typhoid fever 11. In May last year the number of cases was: Diphtheria 45, scarlet fever 3, typhoid fever 10. In May this year there have been fifteen deaths from diphtheria, eight from scarlet fever and one from typhoid.

A Justice Service. Major Delamere, commanding the Queen's Own Rifles, has applied for the use of the Horticultural Pavilion on Sunday morning, June 29, for the purpose of holding a job service, to be participated in by the present and past members of the battalion. The service will be a service in the afternoon of the same day.

Dinner at New Building. W. & D. Dixon, the well-known hatmaker, has taken the new building at the west side of the Union Station, where he has moved his business.

Honored Their Officers. Col. Mason and Major Pellatt's Enthusiastic Send-Off—Departure for the Diamond Jubilee. Lieut.-Col. Mason of the Royal Grenadiers, who will command the infantry and rifle portion of the Canadian Jubilee, and Major Pellatt, of the Queen's Own Rifles, who will be second in command, left Toronto last night by the C. P. R. for Quebec, en route for the Diamond Jubilee.

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Farwell to the two officers, who, at the head of the infantry and rifle corps of the Canadian Jubilee battalion, will receive credit, was a suitable one and redounds to the credit of the city.
