



Paris, Nov. 21 .- The Temps, in a leading editorial today, warns France and Great Britain that with the rapid-The two ships in course of construct ity with which the new Greek govtion are being built for the Dominion ermment is acting the allies will find ment, and efforts have been made from time to time with a view themselves "in the face of a series of accomplished facts."

"To speak frankly," the newspaper adds, "the French public does not understand how the Franco-British negotiations can be delayed by the regretable indisposition of Earl Cur-zon of Kedleston (the British foreign secretary) and how, at the same time, a British admiral can be talking with former King Constantine at Luçerne

The Temps reminds the allies that the "restoration has been accomplishthe "restoration has been accomplish-ed" by the naming of Olga as Regent of Greece and her issuance of a pro-clamation and instructions to the government for the courts to act in the name of Constantine. It points out that the plebiscite in Greece will recall the former king and the new chamber of deputies will ratify the Sevres treaty, thereby binding the signatories under article ten of the League of Nations.
