

PRESIDENT KRUGER DECLINES MR. CHAMBERLAIN'S INVITATION.


WILL NOT VISIT ENGLAND.

Representatives of the Transvall in London-The Venezuelan Situation-Lord Salisbury's Health Poor-His Betirement Predicted-Suppression of Vice in the Strand.

London, April 26 .- The Colonial Office already unofficially knows that Pres. Kruger, in his reply to Mr. Chamberlain's invitation to visit London to discuss the questions pertaining to the Transvaal, practically refuses to come to England. The official reply is awaited. The Daily News predicts that Mr. Chamberlain will quickly accept the refusal and let the matter drop. It is difficult to see what other course will be left open to him, as it is hardly probable that he could force President Kruger to come against his' will and the will of the Volksraad. The prediction is, therefore, a safe one. The policy of Mr. Chamberlain hitherto, though cautious, has been firm and agressive, and it is improbable that he will now submit to the Transvaal Government unless he receives a defi-nite assurance which he will be able to submit to Parliament, showing that British interests in the Transvaal will be protected.
