The importance of good fences is well understood by those who have observed the difference between crops safe from all intruders, and those occasionally trodden down and ruined; between moving on with the work without interruption, and the frequent annoyance of stopping important operations, to run after intruding cattle, colts and pigs. Repairing fences in spring is one of the earliest tasks that claim the farmer's attention. Fences should be annually examined throughout their whole length. New board fences should never be battened on the face or joints over the posts, as the practice tends to cause decay; but when the ends begin to rot and become loosened, battens will secure and make them strong for several years longer. Many old farms are irregularly fenced; but whether old or new, they should, as soon as practicable, be regularly divided in the best manner. The old fences should be removed when necessary, and new ones erected in the right place.

RELAXATION.—That rest of the body which succeeds too hard and successful toil, is not to be compared with the repose which the mind enjoys under similar circumstances. The mind cannot always be attentive—the heart cannot support continual agitation: and both the one and the other require a time for relaxation.
