CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I. April 11—(Special)—Last week when the amendments to the prohibition bill were before the provincial legislature an amendment was carried by 16 to 8 making it possible for druggists to sell, for medicinal purposes only, all drugs and medicines containing alcohol.

Last night, after one of the hottest fights of the session, the amendment was struck out, and hereafter only preparations of the British Pharmacopoeia are exempted. For all others doctors' prescriptions will be necessary. Hon. George E. Hughes put up a strong defence for the amendment, claiming the druggists will henceforth be liable to violate the law almost hourly and that people will be put to great hardship in getting prescriptions for every liniment, family remedy, etc.

BURNED TO CINDERS

Awful Accident on the Canadian Pacific Near Chapleau Yesterday Afternoon --- Cars Were Ditched and Caught Fire--11 Passengers Burned to Death

FORT WILLIAM, Ont., April 11—
(Special)—Information of an accident on the C. P. R., east of Chapleau, reached here yesterday evening, but it is impossible to secure anything like a detailed account.

Later word has just arrived that eleven were burned to death, eight adults and three children, and that from thirty to forty were seriously injured. The case which caught fire was a tourist.

DORCHESTER. N. B. April 11—(Special)—A very shocking accident, with a fatal termination, occurred at the Intercolonial copper mines, about three miles from Dorchester, yesterday afternoon. The accident was caused by the premature explosion of a stick of dynamite
