Kilbane to Train Soldiers
Cleveland, O., Oct. 17.—Johnny Kilbane, champion featherweight pugilist of the world, will leave for Camp Sherman, Chillicothe, Ohio, next week where he will teach the drafted men the art of boxing. He will have the rank of lieutenant. This means Kilbane will have no matches the coming winter.

Hard Bout for Leonard
Attention of New York boxing enthusiasts is now centred about the outcome of a ten-round bout between Ben Leonard, world's lightweight champion, and Jack Britton of Chicago, who formerly held the lightweight title. The contest is arranged for the Harlem S.C. on Friday night and has attracted more attention than any other match that Leonard has participated in since acquiring his title from Freddie Welsh. It will probably be the last "big" match that will be held before the death of the

Frawley law, which will be wiped off the statutes on Nov. 15.

The men have agreed to meet at 138 pounds ringside, and at this figure Leonard feels reasonably safe in taking on his heavier opponent. In fact, the more confident Leonard's supporters are not backward in advancing the theory that the lightweight title holder will win the bout by a knockout.

Among those who incline to the belief that Leonard will stop Britton is Billy Gibson, manager of the lightweight champion, who bases his opinion on Leonard's recent string of knockout victories, starting with Freddie Welsh and including Ritchie Mitchell, Johnny Kilbane, featherweight champion; Leo Jackson, a colored boxer, and other dangerous boxers.

Early Dreams Wins Atlanta Cup.
Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 16.—Five heats were required to determine the winner of the Atlanta Cup, the second pacing event on the card today at Lake Wood Track, the honors finally going to Early Dreams, A. McDermott's Bay Grading, driven by the owner.

In addition to the cup, was the big end of a \$2,500 purse. Lu Princeton, piloted by Cox, fought hard for the first three heats, winning the first and third and coming under the wire in second place on the second and fourth.

The other events were the 2:09 pace, won by Mary Rosalind Parr in three straight heats, with Peter Nash second and Lady Fuller third. The 2:18 trot was won by Meade, and the matron stakes, for 3-year-olds won by Donna Lola against Evelyn Rea Watts, second and Abbie Dryad, third.

TOM LONGBOAT WAS ALIVE WHEN LETTER WAS WRITTEN

Toronto, Oct. 16.—Tommy Daly, who went overseas with the Sportsman's Battalion, in a letter to his mother here, stated that Tom Longboat, the famous Indian runner, had been killed in action. Daly's letter was dated Sept. 28, and according to a press despatch from Stewart Lyon on Oct. 2, from the Canadian Army Headquarters, Tom Longboat on that day competed in the athletic events, running second in both the mile and three-mile races. Therefore, on the face of the foregoing, Daly must have received wrong information.

Bob Mac May Race
Tommy Cotter For
Side Bet of \$500

Sydney, Oct. 15.—The much discussed matched race between Tommy Cotter, 2:14, and Bob Mac, 2:18, may yet take place.

Today G. H. Vail, owner of Tommy Cotter, told the sporting editor of The Record that he had communicated with Simpson Bros., of Amherst, and submitted a proposition to them to race Bob Mac against the local pacer, Mr. Vail will race his horse for a \$500 side bet, best three in five heats, on the Sydney Trotting Park. The reply from Simpson Bros. is expected in a day or two.

Early this season there was considerable talk of a matched race between the two pacers. First it was planned to have the horses meet in Halifax on Sept. 6, but later this fell through and there was some talk of them getting together on the local track. This arrangement also failed to materialize.

Finally the horses came together in the 2:18 pace and 2:10 trot at Halifax, and Bob Mac not only beat Cotter, but showed the way to La Cope and Leila Burns. In this race, however, Cotter wasn't at his best, but later in the Halifax meeting he came back strong and won the 2:16 pace and 2:18 trot, after five hard heats, lowering his record to 2:14. In that race he showed as well as any horse in Halifax and went the third heat in 2:14, which is as fast as most of the horses racing in this section are travelling these heats.

Bob Mac has just had his most successful season. He has never been beaten in all year and also lowered his mark to 2:13. Tommy Raymond has been driving him all year and seems to have got as much, if not more, out of the provincial bred champion as anyone who ever pulled a rein over the Mac horse at a meeting. As for Cotter's driver, Charlie Sweet, it can be said that the Glace Bay trainer has had the local pacer working better than at any time for several years. A meeting between the two horses will be looked forward to with interest, but the owners had better get busy and do as little parlaying as possible, as the racing season is near its end this year.

BARROW LIKELY THE NEW HEAD OF THE AMERICAN LEAGUE

VETERANS WOULD PUT CANADA ON WHEELS

M.H.C. Vocational Advisers Find Craze for Motor Driving Among Returned Men

Ask ninety per cent. of the men who return to Canada from the front disabled for their former occupation, what they would like to do, and they'll ask for a course in motor mechanics.

Tommy's fed up on walking. He has tramped all over France and England and he's done with "shooting it," he wants to ride. The mechanical part he knows little about, but the idea of sitting in a closed car bolted with fourteen inch upholstery and his foot on a brake looks pretty good to him.

The interviewers of the Military Hospital Commission who takes a man's vocational history and hopes on his return to Canada, find that the demand for motor mechanic's courses is far in advance of the need Canada will ever have for motor drivers or menders. It looks to the man who works eight and ten hours a day at shaping veterans' future courses, that every fighting man in Canada wants to be a chauffeur. The whole dominion will have to be motorized to give them jobs.

The interest is manifest, not only by the men who are to learn new trades in the vocational training centres of the M.H.C., but by those who have worked for many years at other trades entirely unrelated. Any number of men with money would throw it over to take up motor mechanics if they were given the opportunity.

Motor mechanics is the Mecca for the industrial fancy of the whole Canadian army, it would seem.
